Most of the engineering on the major projects has been completed and figures should be available within a week's time.

The minister recommended to council that they give very serious consideration to deferring for the present the construction of any new project that is to be financed on the proceeds of a debenture issue unless it is essential. At the present time difficulty is being experienced in the issuing of debentures for a term longer than ten years with interest rates at approximately nine per cent. Debentures with maturities from six to 20 years have been sold in very small amounts in recent

months. The O.M.B. will require as a condition of the approval of the capital expenditure that the debentures issued to finance the cost of a capital project be sold before the board's final approval to proceed is given. The Minister of Municipal Affairs also stated that council should give consideration to financing the cost of capital projects, especially non-essential ones, by the prior accumulation of
