Council okays rabies clinic for N. Halton

Nassagaweya Township Council supported the establishment of free anti-rabies vaccination clinics in the county, following a letter from the Health of Animals branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture suggesting the step.

County joins tax protest

Halton County Council will join in the protests to the Minister of Education about the levies for educational costs, members decided Tuesday.

New rates drawn up by Nassagaweya Planning Board were approved by council, as follows: charge for changes to the zoning by-law, \$75; charge for changes to zoning by-law and official plan, \$125; charge for preparation and changes resulting from a new subdivision, \$10 per acre or \$30 minimum. The township has not charged for these legal and surveyors' services since the zoning by-law came into effect nearly a year ago, although other municipalities in Halton do.

The council ordered preparation of a brief on the subject by the county's finance committee. Deputy-Reeve W. Gillies, pressing for the action, urged that the brief be presented personally to the minister, backed by as many members of county and local councils as possible.

Increased Campbellville calling would affect other area exchanges

Not only the telephone rate structure of the Campbellville "854" exchange, but also those of a number of neighboring municipalities, would be affected if the local calling area of "854" is extended, Bell Canada's area manager Arnold Blachford told Nassagaweya Council Monday evening. Representatives of the company appeared before council to explain the implications of expanded calling power, in answer to requests from township residents for some solution to the telephone problems of Nassagaweyans. The township is the melting pot of several exchanges, and residents are occasionally in the position of having to pay long distance toll charges to get in touch with the neighboring farm.

Mr. Blachford noted, however, Campbellville would jump four rate groups if Guelph, Burlington, Oakville, Acton, Georgetown and Rockwood were added to the local calling area. This would make an addition to the monthly phone bill for Campbellville area subscribers of from 60 cents for a party line to \$5.70 for a business line. In addition, Guelph's move to a higher rate group would come a year earlier, as would Georgetown's increase. Burlington and Oakville would absorb the change, with no noticeable effect on rates. Acton would move to the next highest rate group.

RAISE FOR PLANNERS SUPPORTS McKEOUGH

Dear Sir:
It seems to me that Nassagaweya Council has gone clear out of their cotton picking minds. If ever any single action endorsed Darcy McKeough's plans for regional government, it is our council's decision to make such an exhorbitant increase to the chairman and members of our planning board.

One of the Minister of Municipal Affairs' strongest points is the high cost of supporting small individual municipalities with these many boards, fence caretakers, assessors, etc. etc. Now Nassagaweya's council has played right into his hands by passing this latest increase, and at the same time has penalized those many taxpayers who came out against regional government.

Last year planning board members were paid \$12 and a total of 15 meetings were held i.e., a total of \$180 per member. This year the planning board will receive a straight \$400 per member plus \$500 for the

chairman, (the ex-Reeve who was far too busy to run for election but finds ample time to collect \$500 per year, and travel Ontario expounding his views on regional government. It might be interesting to know who sponsored that trip.)

In my opinion council blundered, and blundered badly. Surely there are enough qualified and dedicated people in Nassagaweya who would consider it their civic duty to serve on these various boards, without remuneration except when attending meetings outside of the Township boundaries, when they would accept a gasoline allowance.

We do not need these dollar-hungry mercenaries who serve us just to turn another buck, and would be much better served by the type of person who would consider it an honor to serve his community and his fellow man, without bowing to the Almighty Buck.
