

First high school open house, a lively colorful happening

Open House at the high school last Thursday night was a long way from the traditional parent-teacher pep talk sessions. As many students as parents were on hand to demonstrate equipment, explain displays and take an active part in panel discussions on current issues.

The evening proved an excellent opportunity for parents and friends to find out what's happening on the high school scene. Visitors to the math department could test their skills with a number of up-to-date math games and sheets of "Arithmetic-tricks". In the science wing, spectators had a chance to watch electrons travel in colour through a cathode tube, or electrical impulses registering on an electric oscilloscope.

Among projects on display were a row of three dimensional geography scenes and a full size sail boat made in the wood shop. Mr. McGillivray's merchandising room featured a display of advertisements designed by students.

In addition to department displays, the various activity clubs added color and interest. Photography enthusiasts put up an arty display inside the south door. From the science club, was a colony of mice including babies only two days old. The club has been using the animals in a study of genetics.

previous trip. Highlighting the evening was a geography lesson on Acton taught by Mr. Martindale in which several parents took part in the discussion. Summing up the event one visitor remarked, "It's too bad so many parents appear to have stayed home to watch the hockey game."
