

# Curling Cues

Forty-four enthusiastic curlers of the Acton Curling Club met at the Robert Little School last Wednesday evening to hear the proposals of the Building and Finance committees on the building of the curling club on Churchill Road.

Chairman A. H. McKenzie opened the meeting with a brief resume of the efforts in getting a curling club building started in previous years, as far back as 1964.

John Goy was spokesman for the committee of E. G. Tyler Sr., Jack Ridley, Rev. A. H. McKenzie, H. Otterbein, Chas. Leatherland, and Wes. Beatty. He outlined the efforts to procure financing for the new building. It is estimated that the total cost for the club will be \$80,000. It is planned to pay a quarter of the amount and borrow the rest from a trust company.

Wes. Beatty said he felt that the money could be borrowed, if enough of the members of the club would lend their credit to the project.

Ted Tyler Sr. stated that if the club was to be ready for occupancy by October, a start would have to be made in June. He felt that the club could be operating for the coming season.

Forms for the signatures of the prospective members who were willing to lend their credit to the club were presented by C. F. Leatherland.

At the weekend some 35 members had turged in their forms with a credit backing of \$40,000. This is two-thirds of the bare minimum required to make the start on the club. It is expected that the amount will be over-subscribed by those interested in getting the building started. Each unit amounts to \$500, and an average of over two units were subscribed by those turning in their forms.
