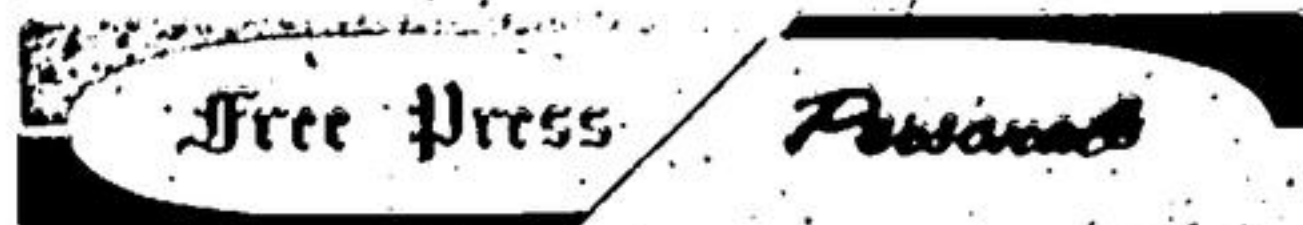
Brampton Presbyterial is host
