

**NALTON
County Council
MEMORANDA**

During the regular meeting of Halton County Council Tuesday, May 20 in the Administration Building, Council:

• Heard a delegation of County Weed Inspector Douglas Currie and several municipal weed inspectors had discussed control problems with the Agriculture, E.M.O. and Planning Committee; and approved the attendance of the County Inspector at a seminar on weed control in Guelph.

• Learned the Emergency Measures Organization co-ordinator had begun a six-week radio operators' course.

• Appointed H. J. Newman as display co-ordinator for the county display at the next International Flowering Match. A house trailer is to be rented for the display. A large truck was to be obtained for showing the county film. Theme of this display will be 116 years of progress in Halton.

• Agreed with the Board of Health approval of a suggestion by the County Property Committee to use the lower floor of a building in Oakville for a branch office and dental clinic. The as-yet-unconstructed building will be on Lakeshore Road West at Maurice Drive; and Health Unit quarters are to be 2,816 square feet in area at a cost of \$4.15 including maintenance per square foot; with parking for not less than 27 cars. The property committee has been authorized to proceed with negotiations.

• Approved purchase of summer uniforms for the nursing staff at a cost of not more than \$40 each, and heard the four nurses sponsored by the 1968 Board of Health will shortly be joining the staff. A further application has been received from a Public Health Nurse wishing to join in September.

• Granted the Town of Burlington a levy prepayment discount of six and one-half per cent, or slightly less than prime bank borrowing rate; as compared to the previous rate of five per cent discount. A previous motion calling for a discount one per cent below bank rate was defeated.

• Agreed to a request from Nassagaweya for a county grant of \$3,150 to cover one-quarter of the cost of re-surveying the Village of Campbellville.

• Decided to re-inform Guelph General Hospital of the County policy of refraining from capital grants for construction outside the county, since the hospital appeared to again be requesting financial assistance with their new addition.

• Authorized the Child Welfare Committee to conduct a feasibility study on establishing a Regional Social and Family service unit at the county level. The Medical Officer of Health has been asked to investigate and report back to the committee on whether or not the establishment of nursing services for secondary schools by the County Board of Education is a duplication of services presently offered by the County Health Unit.

• Heard a report from the Halton Manor Committee of Management there were five entrance applications during the month, including two each from Burlington and Milton and one from Oakville. It was also learned a list is being prepared by Dr. J. W. McCutcheon, concerning the Manor's needs of talking books for blind residents.

• Resolved to accept the lowest bid received for replacing shrubberies destroyed by mice during winter from Caroline Nurseries of Acton.

A young farm manager from Henderdale Farm on Burlington's Burnhamthorpe Road, shot and killed a marauding wolf with one shot from a .22 calibre rifle Sunday.

Joe MacRae, who has only been at the farm for two months has lost 10 ducks to the marauder and when he was out in his field, he spotted the wolf chasing some horses.

He spotted the wolf again Sunday and went back to his house for his rifle. One shot was enough to down the animal.

Mr. MacRae hopes to claim the bounty for the animal from the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests office in Kitchener.

**Would confine delegations
to mid-month council meet**

Delegations to Nassagaweya Council will be confined as much as possible to the mid-monthly meetings in future, council decided at its meeting Tuesday evening, May 20.

The heavy volume of work council must get through this year has resulted in several meetings closing times of midnight or past.

Council recalled at least one evening when attention to delegations didn't end until after 10:30 p.m. and delegations are second items on the agenda.

Co-operation from persons wishing to speak to council will be requested, to keep the first-of-the-month meeting free for steady attention to other council business.

Council received news during the meeting of the death that day of Charles MacArthur, husband of deputy-reeve Mrs. A. MacArthur.

Neither deputy-reeve MacArthur nor councillor James Watson were present at the two-hour meeting.

Quarry licenses were granted for 1969 to Halton Crushed Stone, Dufferin Materials and Construction, W. G. McPhail, Charles Mitchell and John Pries. An application for a license from William Mahon was held pending further investigation by council. Zoning administrator S. W. Savage noted in a written report he and township clerk C. McIntyre toured the township recently to determine the number of house trailers in Nassagaweya, and the circumstances under which they are there.

It was noted there are 26 of them.

A by-law number 20-69 was passed, rescinding by-law number 13-69 which had re-zoned land for the proposed new Ontario Plastics building, following receiving a letter from the company asking to withdraw application for the land.

A delegation from Canadian Pacific Railways, including Mr. Gillespie and three others, appeared before council to ask the township to withdraw its objection to removal of express service from Guelph Junction.

Council agreed to reconsider the earlier motion voicing objection. Reeve Hoey had cast a deciding vote on a previous motion to rescind the objection, noting he did not feel the council should rescind a motion, once they had made it.

Correspondence was received from Peter K. McWilliams, solicitor for Milton Brick Co., requesting council to take action on the large amount of refuse dumped on Brick Co. property on the southern portion of the Nassagaweya-Esqueving Town Line.

Council had, at a previous meeting, taken action; but noted the majority of trash was on the Esqueving side of the road anyway.

A letter from Alex Barrett of Lot 15, Concession 1, requesting levelling of a vision-obstructing elevation on the First Line in front of his home, was referred to the Roads Committee.

Presbyterian church marks 107th anniversary**

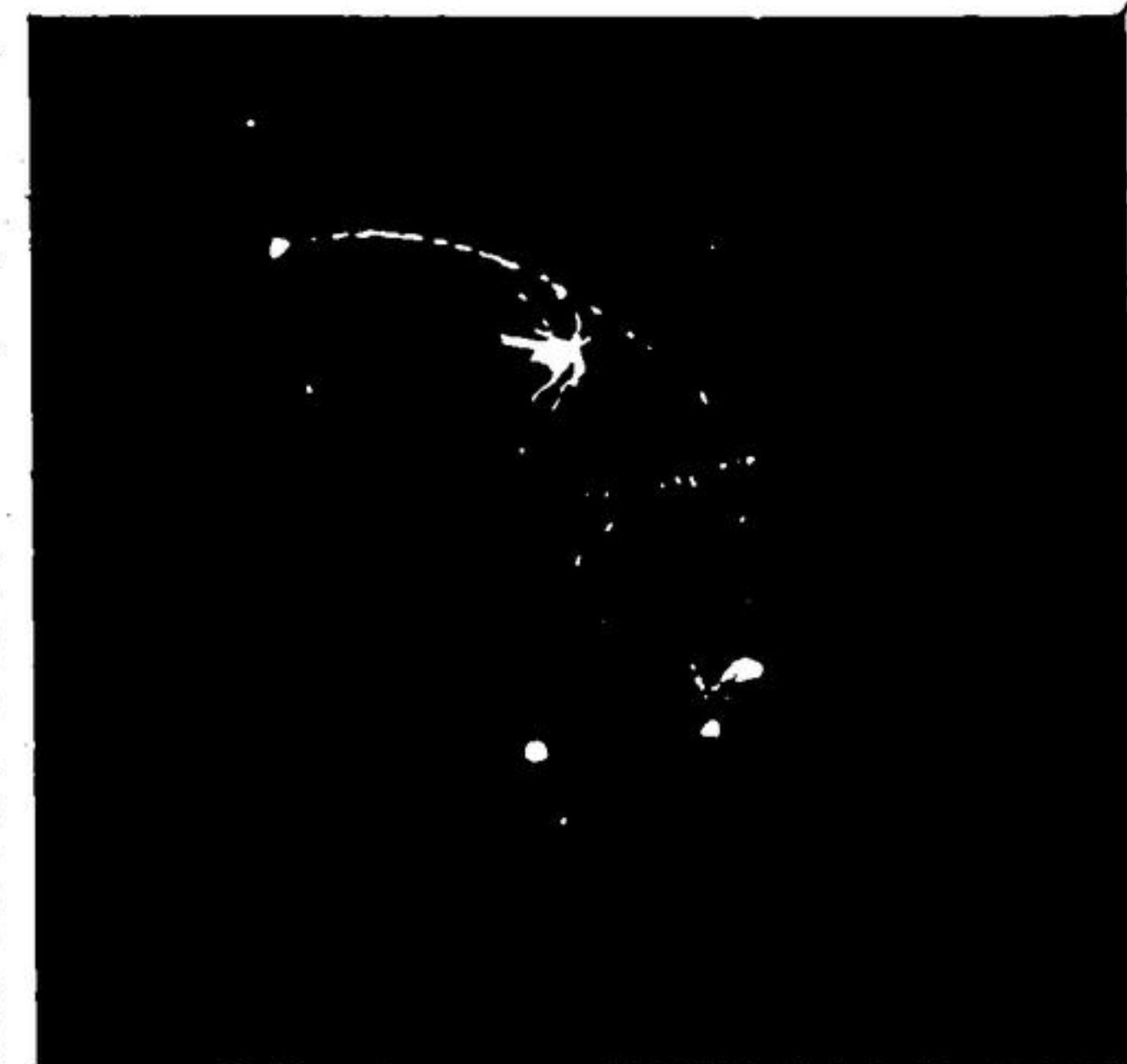
