During the regular June meeting of Nassagaweya Township Council Monday evening, Council:

• Learned of the establishment of a rabies vaccination clinic in the Township garage from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. June 9; and agreed to supply clerical assistance to the project.

• Agreed to have council representation at the 71st annual convention of the Ontario Municipal Association in Niagara Falls.

• Passed a by-law adjusting Nassagaweya's share of funds requisitioned by the Halton County Board of Education, cutting the levy by roughly \$63,000.

• Passed a by-law making application to the Master of Titles, Milton to confirm boundaries within the police village of Campbellville, in preparation for that community's re-surveying project.

• Endorsed action by the town of Oakville and County of Wellington rejecting a deer hunt this year, in view of the numerous homes and children in wooded areas of the township.
