"GOOD NEWS FOR ACTON"
 (John 1:17) "The Law was given by Moses but grace and truth came by Jesus Christ."
 The "Good News" is the gospel of Christ and what does this gospel offer us? First, it offers us "Forgiveness". Paul, in (Galatians 1:4) says, "He gave Himself for our sins." Here we have God's best in contact with man's worst. The holiest One in Heaven with the foulest thing on earth. What must sin be in the eyes of God when it took the life and death and all the wealth of the character of His Son to put it away? "Now in Him we have redemption through His blood—even the forgiveness of sins." (Eph. 1:7).
 The gospel offers us "deliverance" for Gal. 1:4 says "That He might deliver us from this present evil world (age)." Not only is there deliverance from sickness by the "stripes" which Jesus bore, and from our sins by His death on the Cross, but He delivers from the power of sin and death. "He breaks the power of cancelled sin and sets the prisoner free" because He who died in our place arose triumphant from the Tomb over death, sin and Satan, and said, "I am He that liveth and was dead; and behold I am alive forevermore, Amen; and have the keys of hell and of death." In this present evil world, by His mighty power of deliverance He is able to keep you from falling." (Jude 24).

The gospel also offers grace and peace. Grace sufficient to meet your every need, and the peace of God to keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." (Phil. 4:7) How are these blessings received, and how can we make sure they are ours? We must be "called into the Grace of Christ by this Gospel", to enter into the full enjoyment of that Grace, abounding which is in Christ Jesus. There is no other way but by the obedience of faith. You believe the message; you obey the call, and the Grace of God does the rest.
 This Gospel cannot be perverted. God's Word is always and everywhere the same. Many Gentiles think that they ought to be compromised and God will save them because of their moral character and "good works". Anything we can do, or be, will never add value to the saving Grace of God in Jesus Christ. "Therefore it is by faith—that it might be by Grace." (Rom. 4:16).
 Neither the wisdom of the ages, nor all time, nor eternity will ever produce another Gospel whereby sinful man, without the Grace of God in His Son, can be saved. Jesus said, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life, no man cometh unto the Father but by Me". "He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life, and He that believeth not the Son shall not see "Life", but the wrath of God abideth on him" . . . Believe that this?

Catholic Women's League report year's achievements

Financial assistance to education including scholarships and bursaries, donations to school projects totaled \$9,800, for the year 1968-69, delegates to the 49th annual diocesan Convention, C.W.L. in Guelph were told last week.
 Mrs. B. M. Barron conducted the business sessions when reports from conveners of standing committees yielded the following statistics on the year's achievement of 106 Councils in the diocese:
 Membership stands at 15,484; assistance to parishes amounted to \$64,716; donations to missions at home and abroad amounted to \$7,026., with \$12,786. spent on community welfare.
 Social action programs increased over the past year with many councils conducting study clubs and buzz sessions, with many taking the form of ecumenical meetings, when neighbouring churches were invited to attend to become acquainted with the needs of the community as a whole and to give assistance wherever the need was evident.

Members gave volunteer help and entertained the aged, are volunteers on meals-on-wheels programs; hospitals; driving patients to clinics; work on community fund-raising drives; assist at nursery schools and day-care centres, organized

UNICEF program in one city. One Ranger Company consisting of seven Rangers; 42 Guides companies with 1,108 Guides; and 53 Brownie Packs with 1,543 Brownies are also sponsored.
 Social Welfare Project, and educational program was conducted throughout the diocese to acquaint the public with the needs of the children in the care of the Children's Aid Societies in the Province of Ontario.

The Bible today

During 1968 the Korean Bible Society distributed 260,000 free Scriptures.
 Commenting on this in his annual report the Secretary says, "Sometimes we wonder what happens to those free New Testaments we give out. A young soldier was lost from his unit during the Korean War and, after wasting the whole day trying to get in touch with his own unit, finally began to realize that he might be captured by the enemy. In preparation he examined his belongings and threw most of them away. But he wanted to keep the New Testament he had received from his chaplain.
 It was far too big to hide and he knew that the enemy would not allow him to keep it. So he tore only the Gospel of Mark apart and pasted it together leaf by leaf with pieces of steamed rice and rolled it like a cigarette and hid it in a seam in his uniform.
 During the long wintry days at internment in Northern Korea he would sit with a few other Christian soldiers. Whenever the guard outside walked away, they pulled out this cigarette-shaped Gospel of Mark and read it to each other quickly and put it back as soon as they heard footsteps outside.
 This young soldier was later released through the exchange of prisoners and now is teaching at a college in Seoul. He tells people, "It was this cigarette-shaped Gospel which helped us to keep the fire of hope burning during those difficult days."
