## Armitage flays Oakville

"The Halton County Board of Education will continue to act in the best interests of the county as a whole and will not be pressured or intimidated by any local municipal group", Board Chairman F. Armitage declared after Oakville Council agreed last week to pay its levy for education.

In a highly critical statement on the actions of Oakville Council, the chairman suggested the council indicated a lack of willingness to want to understand the issues.

"It is a great tribute to

former Oakville board members and members of the staff that they were able with considerable success to build a fine education system in Oakville in spite of an adverse climate created by annual wrangling and harassment of Oakville Council. The Halton Board will not allow such tactics to adversely affect the quality of education and the staff morale in the County."

He observed that the board did not believe in "putting on a public show of budget cutting items which should never be there in the first place".
