Sheridan equipment school grad

Armless Indian drives dozer

An unusual story of high courage in the face of low blows from life has warmed the hearts of everyone in the know at the Sheridan College Heavy Equipment School near Milton.

Eddie Jones, 30, a full-blooded American Indian who grew up at Cape Croker, received his diploma Friday, June 6, as a bulldozer driver. Scarcely remarkable? But Eddie lost both his arms 10 years ago. They were seared off when Eddie was trapped in a flaming car. He escaped with his life, but he spent a full two years in and out of hospitals before he was fitted with two artificial arms. Then he set about learning how to use them.

And Friday Eddie graduated (shy, timid, and not one to make much of such an extraordinary achievement) as just one of 40 members of the graduation class at Sheridan College's Heavy Equipment School, who received their certificates from Jack Maher, chief of programs for the Ontario Region of the Federal Department of Manpower and Immigration.

Eddie and his classmates had just completed nine weeks of training on a variety of heavy machines—bulldozers, front end loaders, excavators, graders, scrapers; you name it, and somebody knows how to operate it.

Their certificates say that they are each now qualified to operate, service and maintain two different types of vehicles. Eddie's particular love was the bulldozer.

"I wanted to work outside," said the shy man. "I got the idea of operating heavy equipment this time last year. I asked around, and . . ."

The asking around meant an interview with Heavy Equipment School supervisor Wilf Fournier of Bramales, who advised Eddie to shoot at a spring class, where jobs were easiest to come by for fresh, inexperienced graduates. That left Eddie with a free 10 months and he, unwilling to be idle in the face of his new-found ambition, registered at Jones Avenue School in Toronto and proceeded to polish off his grades 9 and 10. The laudatory remarks of staffers at Jones

Avenue matched those of staff of Milton. Mr. Fournier was an echo when he gave the opinion that Eddie had more "guts" than any four men on the course. Eddie had begun a career prior to his accident, working in a lumberyard in Detroit. That went by the board, though, and he hasn't worked at all in the eight years since he got his new arms.

What's ahead for Eddie Jones? With black eyes snapping and alight with excitement, Eddie told of starting his new job at Pitts Construction, Commercial Rd., Leaside. And would he take the day off between graduation and the start of work? Un-unh. Eddie had an appointment with his other schoolmaster, a driver, too. They would together to the place where Eddie planned to take his road test for his driver's licence. Eddie Jones is on his way.

Let's Play Bridge

Here is an interesting hand that came up in a rubber bridge match. It's difficult to bid slam and difficult to make slam. Maybe it's just as well if you cannot make twelve tricks you shouldn't bid to that level.

NORTH
S-A-9-8-3
H-A-K-7-2
D-Void

The bidding:
NORTH 1H

Opening lead - King of diamond. There are two inferences that can be drawn from North's bidding. Both of these helped South bid the slam. When South responded one spade to North's opener, it increased the potential of North's hand. His jump shift to three club announced a big hand, usually at least 19 points, and put a game force into effect. South kept the bidding open with three no trumps. Now South supported spades. When a player bids three suits and includes a jump bid he can have at the most a singleton in the fourth suit. After checking for aces, South bids the slam knowing that there is at the most one diamond loser. Although there are no apparent quick losers in the North-South hands, it is difficult to count to 12 tricks. There are four spade tricks plus a ruff, two club tricks and possibly four heart tricks - and that's only 11. It's too much to hope for a three-three split in hearts plus the queen in West's hand. Declarer could try for a split in clubs, but even then the heart finesse must be right. Declarer decided to try for a heart finesse or a three-three split in hearts not necessarily both plus an additional diamond ruff. The opening

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
