**SPECIFICATIONS:** Clean and remove all loose and damaged stucco, and repair all holes and cracks.

All holes to be repaired will be reinforced with Domtar Crystallite reinforcement 2" sq. mesh No. 16, 1W, ga. or equal. Stucco base to be Domtar Crystallite neat base or equal to be applied in two 3/8 coats or to manufacturer's specifications. The base must be allowed to dry for a minimum of two weeks before application of final finished coat. Final exterior finish coat to be Domtar Crystallite exterior finish or equal, and to be finished so as to match existing exterior stucco finish.

Upon completion of repairs, entire building to be prepared for and painted one coat only with Domtar Shield cement paint or equal, color to be buff.

All work to be guaranteed in writing for a period of one year from date of final completion of all work pertaining to this Tender.

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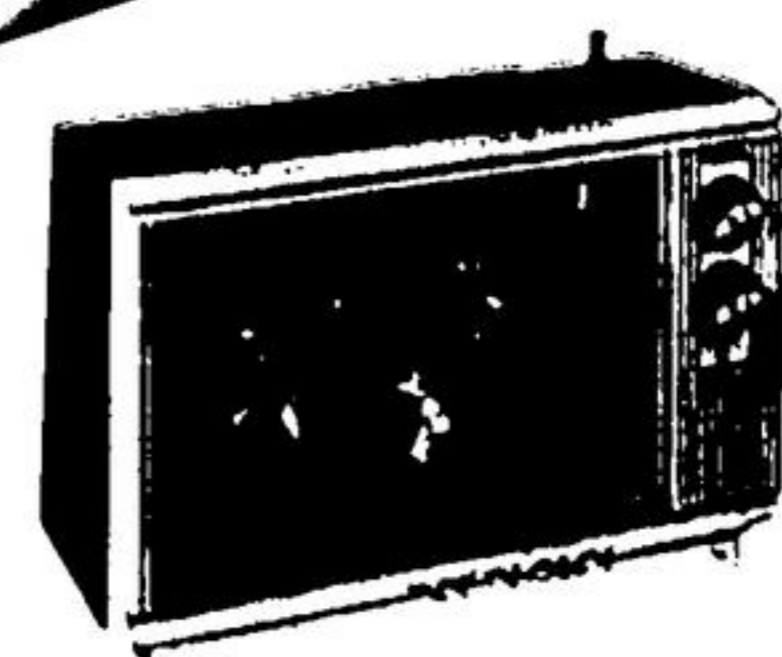
