With your permission I would appreciate having a letter printed in your paper concerning the long closure imposed on the Roslake resort since July 1966, which has recently been lifted. Its lengthy duration has been damaging from a business aspect as well as prestige. The issue has had widespread publicity from time to time, and we hope the hatchet will remain buried. I have recorded in the form of a diary the development of the Roslake complex since its inception in 1965, and should like to submit from my diary the excerpt relative to the controversy and its resolution.

Diary quote:

June 5, 1969. I am expecting an inspection tour of our resort by the M.O.H. and two of his inspectors at 2 p.m.

June 6-It was a congenial meeting. The four of us toured the airport runway and horse trail which took us to the beach. We strolled around the swim area, the dam and the island. This was the first visit by the M.O.H. He offered no criticisms or suggestions. As we sat down on a picnic bench by a fireplace viewing the water and sun in the background, he remarked, "This is a very beautiful place." From now on it will be classified as a swim area or bathing beach instead of "swimming pool", coming under different regulations.

Trustee L. D. Palmer suggested the policy would make the process more complicated, rather than less. "I feel this is much ado about nothing and we're better off without a policy."

Conservation Week

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority will join with 11 other conservation authorities in Ontario participating in Conservation Week from July 5 to 13.

Formed in 1954, the Credit Valley Conservation Authority is composed of 16 municipalities in the Credit River Valley from Orangeville in the north and Acton-Hillsburgh in the west to Lake Ontario at Port Credit.

Total population in the Valley is 130,000 and a levy of about 90 cents per capita plus grants from the Department of Energy and Resources Management to make up the working capital of the Authority.
