## Confirmation for candidates at Rockwood, Erin churches

Bishop W. E. Bagnall officiated at the service and the confirmations were presented by Rev. E. J. Sewell, Rector of the Parish. Ronald Holcroft was the

Bishop's Chaplain for the service after which a parish supper and reception was held. Greetings were extended to all candidates, relatives and godparents, and also to Bishop and Mrs. Bagnall on their visit to the Parish with the prayer that the occasion be a significant and memorable event to all concerned.

In his address, Bishop Bagnall said in effect "That we must all

repel evil and, although we think it is a very trying time right now for Christians to stand true to their beliefs, it was even more difficult for the early Christians when they were actually defying death to acknowledge theirs."

The Erin Church was packed with relatives and friends of the candidates many of whom stayed afterwards for the reception.

## Mixed impressions of Moosonee trip

"The best group of kids I've ever taken on any bus trip!" These words of tribute were given by the Norton Bus Lines driver from Burlington, Ontario, as he stepped back into the bus and waved goodbye to the children and their chaperones after their eventful and enjoyable trip to Moosonee.

Tony Froulx is the name of the man who drove the bus, took absolute charge while the merry throng was on the move, and became a delightful friend of every child and adult on the entire trip.

"He was just wonderful" said many of the happy children, "and he even bought us and a number of the Indian children we were with chips and pop at the canteen at Moose Factory."

In a constant state of excited anticipation the "Pennies for Moosonee" travelers made the journey without mishap. With an "Okay, it's time for the adults to move to the back of the bus" from "Tony bus driver" as he was affectionately dubbed by the children, there would then be an exchange of seats at the back of the vehicle where two sets of tables gave them an area for playing cards or whatever whilst on the move.

They carried out their schedule with a few unexpected innovations such as the tourist eye view of the North Bay Teacher's College from which their own Mrs. R. Storey had graduated. Everyone and everything was fun.

Humorous little incidents made the journey even more complete. Everybody howled with laughter when "Fuzzy" Liddle, being vocally hurried by his friends to "Hurry because they were leaving" after their swim at Departure Lake with another Grade Seven Class from the Smooth Rock Public School, managed to dry off one foot and replace his shoe and sock, only to plant it down into the water in an effort to dry off his other foot. "Hurry up!" said the driver again, and little Michael dripped into the bus loaded with laughing children.

Impressions of the journey are mixed. Children saw things differently than the adults and no two children could tell the exact same story. Some children were distressed at the muck around the area of the new Educational centre in Moosonee itself.

The adults could feel the excitement of a great new north country opening up and they realized that every new building area looks grim and foreboding

until landscaping has begun. Some children were amazed at the efficiency and discipline of the little Indian children at the Residential School in Moose Factory, the adults were impressed at the beauty of the area. "Really," said Mrs. Cy. DeVries, as she sipped coffee during an interview. "We weren't there long enough to touch on all the things we wanted to. I only wish I could live up there in the peace and quiet of it all, it's so rugged and wonderful."

There'll be stories of excursions, visits to historical places of interest, the Lookout Tower at North Bay over the Lake, the four-hour bus break down when they were on the way up, and the "blown tire incident" on the stop off after the Kirkland Lake museum visit, which delayed their arrival home. The children took slides and photographs as planned, with many little mementos tucked into their luggage. "It was a trip I'll probably never make again, but it was the one I'll never forget," said Mrs. DeVries who, along with Mrs. Joan Guild, was one of the chief instigators of the trip in as much as it was they who organized many of the ways of making the required money.

Mrs. DeVries is a wonderful mother, affiliated with the Ontario Children's Aid Society, who knows what living is all about. She and Mrs. Guild felt that all the co-operation from the other school children, teachers and parents was fantastic and said that they were grateful to have been able to make the trip. "The children were absolutely marvellous. We didn't have to speak twice at any time. The bus driver Tony was terrific, and we had a wonderful time," said Mrs. Guild.

So, with their many thanks to Mrs. Storey, without whom there would never have been such a trip, the children plan to show slides to audiences in the fall and only then will those of us who couldn't be there, have an opportunity of visiting Moosonee through the eyes of the photo lens.
