PRAYER - TALKING TO GOD SECOND ISSUE

Perhaps while talking to a friend, you have been asked the question, "Have you seen or been talking to so and so lately?" and your answer was "No, by the way, I haven't seen, so and so (mentioning his name) for some time. I wonder where he's been? In fact it must be two or three or four weeks since I have been talking to him or perhaps longer than that. And now that you mention his name he is the very one who can put me straight on that matter we were discussing some time ago. I sure would like to have a chat with him. He is always receptive. No matter how busy he is he always has time to chat with you and listen to you. And, oh boy, isn't it a pleasure to talk to him. He is very intelligent - well versed in all subjects; can put you straight on any problems and so generous if you need help. He is very sympathetic in time of trouble and even has a good sense of humor."

There is a saying dear friends "That you can live without a relative but you can't live without a real true good friend or neighbor."

There are some characters in the world like this. They may not be many. But there is ONE who surpasses all others, who loves us to chat and talk to Him often.
