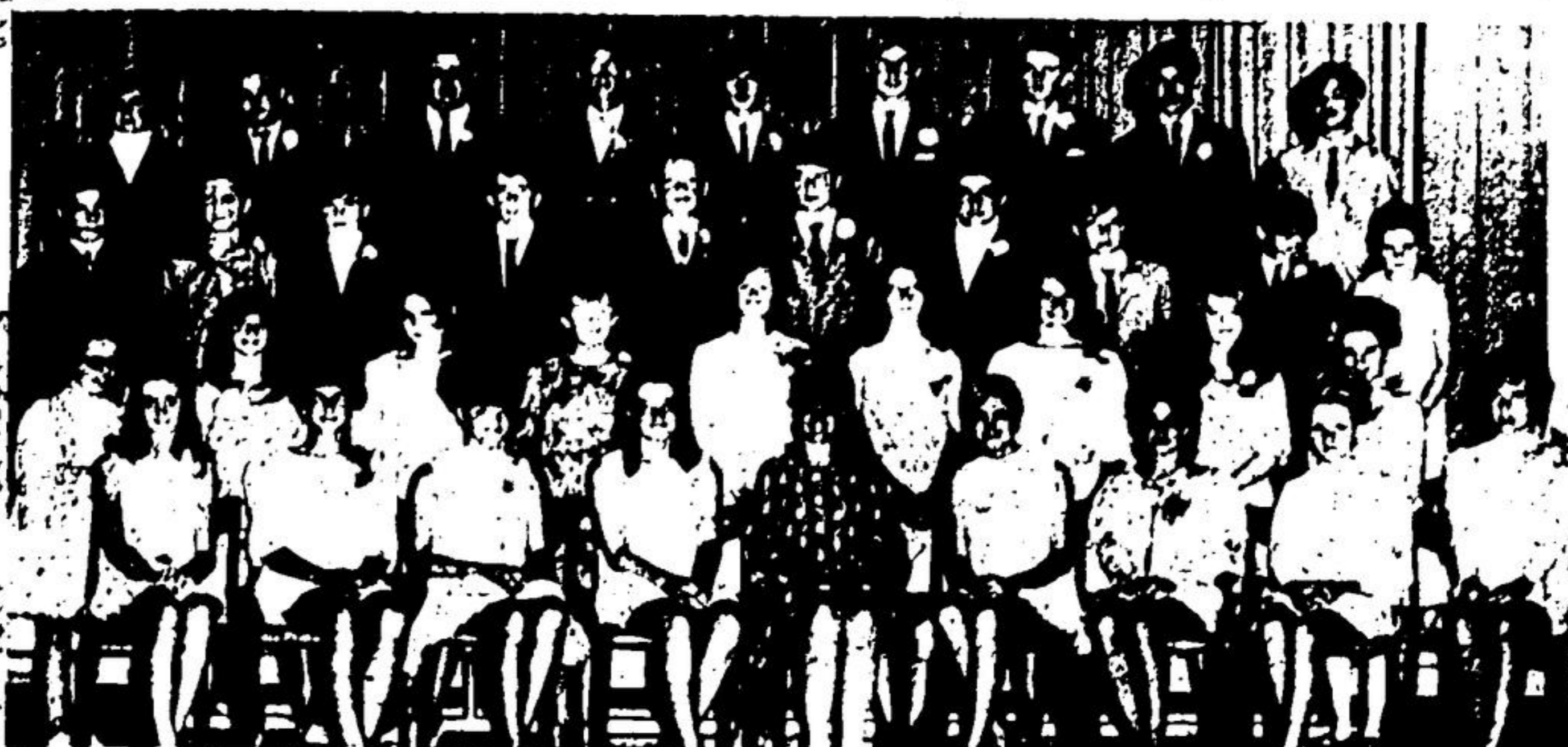

Acton hosts zone picnic in park
