

Dwayne Hay first winner junior golf tournament

A birdie on the first extra hole of sudden death play gave Dwayne Hay of Georgetown the junior championship at last Friday's first annual Junior Golf Tournament, held in conjunction with National Golf Week, at Acton Meadows.

Both Dwayne and Paul Greenwood, also of Georgetown, fired brilliant rounds of 70, but Dwayne wrapped up first place

by carding a three on the par-4 first hole, while Paul recorded a par.

It was not the first championship for Dwayne. For the last three years, he has been junior champion at Georgetown Golf and Country Club, and two years ago he played on the Ontario team, which represented Ontario against Quebec.

Fredovich of Erin shot an 85 to win low gross. Low net honors went to Gary Saul, with a 70.

Bantam division winner was Rick Hodge of Erin, 104 (79½). A special prize was presented to Eric Couture of Acton, the smallest player to compete in the tournament. Diminutive Eric posted a 110 (73¼), including a very respectable 49 on the back nine.

Cathy Hinton, of Acton, won the girls' championship with a score of 108 (80).

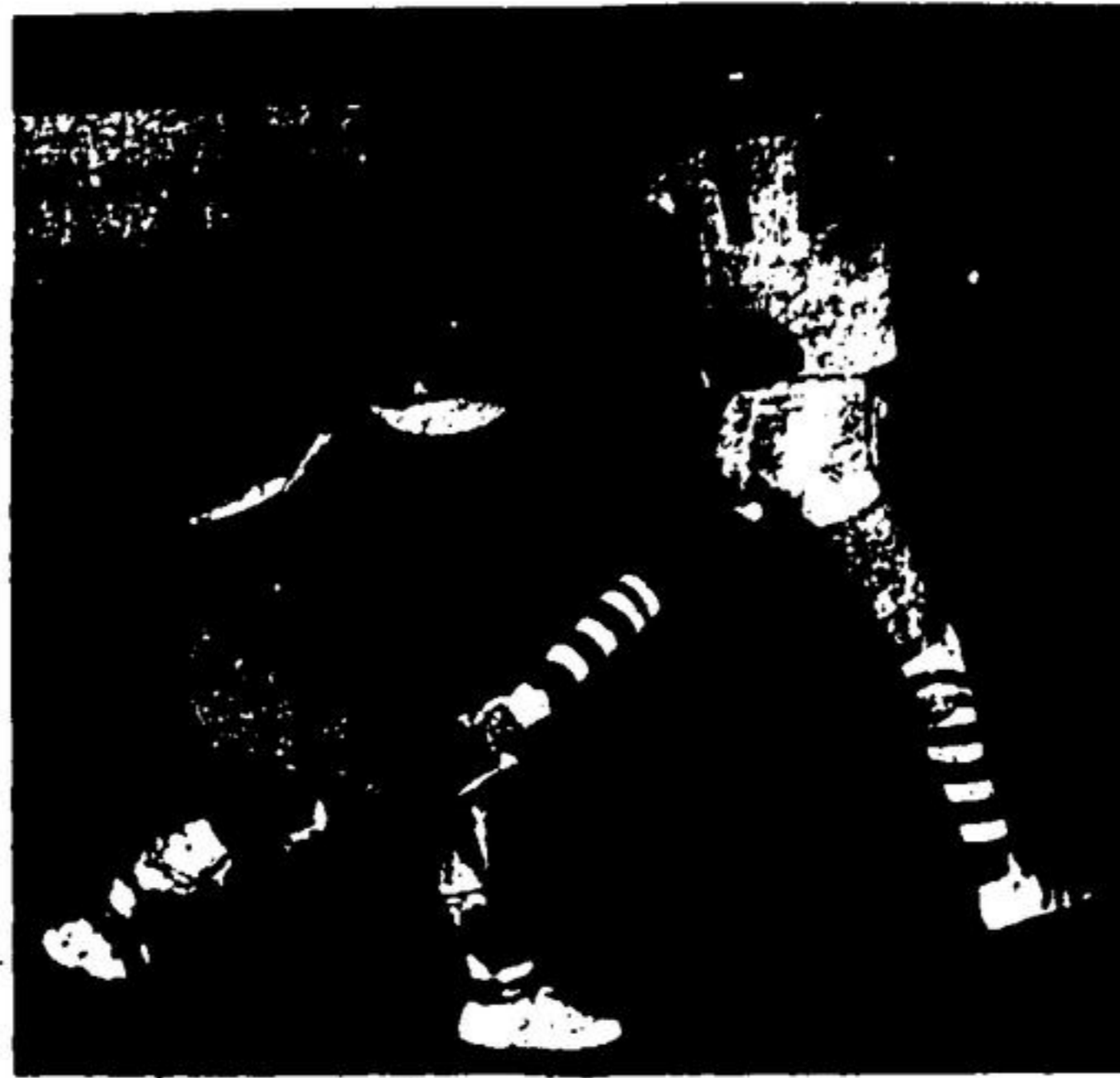
