my first stop was Jarry Park, home of the Montreal Expos.

I took advantage of the long weekend to pay my first visit ever, to the city of Montreal and naturally, being the baseball bug I am,

Expos were scheduled to host the Philadelphia Phillies in a 2:15 start, Saturday afternoon, so I hustled on down to Jarry Park at noon hour, bought a box seat and stayed to watch both teams take batting and fielding practice.

Jarry Park is a converted minor-league baseball stadium, brought to major league standards during the past winter. The stadium is cozy and provides a good view of the field from almost anywhere. It is part of a City of Montreal sports complex, that covers an area of 5,143,713 square feet.

Like most new stadiums, however, it does have its disadvantages. Because it is not entirely enclosed, the wind sometimes becomes a problem. Both Rusty Staub and I will vouch for that. I spent a good deal of my time wiping the dust that had blown off the infield, out of my eyes, while Rusty, Expo's right fielder tried to guess where the wind was going to carry the next fly ball!

The stadium is also without a roof, which means that when the sun is shining you had better have either your cap or your sunglasses with you and that if it happens to start raining, there just isn't anywhere to run for cover.

Nevertheless, the game itself produced enough exciting action to make up for whatever the stadium lacked in the way of comfort. Expos jumped on Phillie starter Woody Fryman for four runs in the first inning, which prompted manager Bob Skinner to remove Mr. Fryman in favor of veteran reliefer Dick Farrell.

In the third, that nasty wind worked to the Phillies' advantage, when it blew Ricardo Joseph's routine fly ball over the right field fence for a three run homer.

Expo pitcher Bill Stoneman, who hurled a no-hitter, earlier this year had looked fairly impressive up until the sixth inning, when "the roof", if you'll pardon the expression, really caved in on him.

Ron Stone singled, Terry Harman was safe on an error and pinch-hitter Gene Stone walked, before Stoneman hit Tony Taylor with a pitch, to force in a run.

Manager Gene Mauch brought in Elroy Face, who had formerly distinguished himself as a member of the Pittsburgh Pirates. But Elroy just didn't have it Saturday, and after he hit Cookie Rojas with a pitch to force in another run, husky John Briggs hit one of his forkballs so far out of sight that even Rusty Staub didn't have to worry about it!

The Phillies made it a cakewalk after that, finally running up a 13-8 score.

The Expos, especially Staub and Adolfo Phillips did look impressive at the plate, and their infield turned in three double plays, but it was quite obvious that pitching is their weakness.

One thing they do not lack is fan support. The cheering, shouting and horn blowing in the stands never ceased. In fact one fan, who had apparently got his seasons mixed up, blew a whistle each time the Phillie pitcher was ready to throw!

Jarry Park may not be the most comfortable stadium in the majors, and the Expos are hardly what you could call pennant contenders, but the combination does produce plenty of surprises and lots of exciting baseball action.
