Seniors' homes for Georgetown

A mortgage to finance a 24-unit senior citizen housing project on Georgetown's southern boundary has been approved by the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, Halton East M.P.P. Jim Snow announced this week.

The units are to be built on a two acre site on Hyde Park Dr., Georgetown, which was supplied by the Kinsmen Club of Georgetown. The \$193,902 contract for the work has been awarded to Zorge Construction Ltd. of Georgetown. The CMHC mortgage covers \$174,512 of the cost and the balance is being taken over by the Ontario Housing Corporation, Mr. Snow said.
