Our nation was built and founded on precepts from the Word of God, the Bible, and we neglect it to our peril. The Sunday is more a holiday than a holy day. 

One of the speakers at this year's Conference of the Evangelical Fellowship of India was Mr. Paul Sudhakar from South India. Before coming to Christ he was a Hindu Brahmin and took a very dim view of Christians. He said he divided Christians into three groups: (1) those who could not think; (2) those who dared not think; and (3) those who would not think.

It was not the testimony of any missionary or Christian national which won him, but rather the message of a Bible which he bought from another Hindu Brahmin. He said having that Book in his hands was like dynamite, and having been a student of history he was captured by the genealogy listed in Matthew 1, as it presented the message of Christ as having taken place within history rather than simply a myth or legend. As he read the next few chapters of Matthew he surrendered to the invitation of the Holy Spirit and three days later was baptized.


