That's in the daytime. At night, Mr. Michael and Mr. John give their attention to men's hair styling when some of the clients include the Duke of Bedford, film actors Richard Johnson, Yab Hunter and Michael Crawford.

Mr. Michael explains he has been in the business for 15 years. Mr. John has a decade of hair styling behind him. Both

"The theme of the building is the Way of the Future, and visitors will view one of the largest and most futuristic

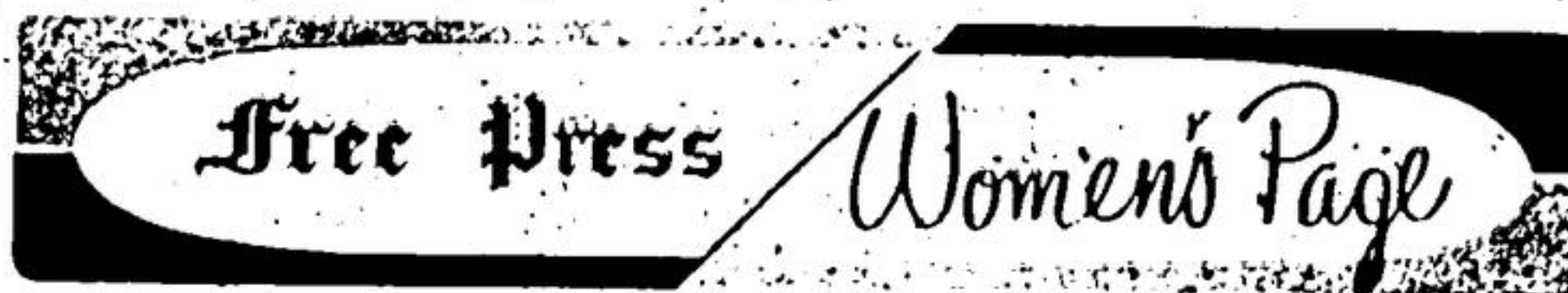
galaxies of furniture, furnishings and fashion in Canada.
