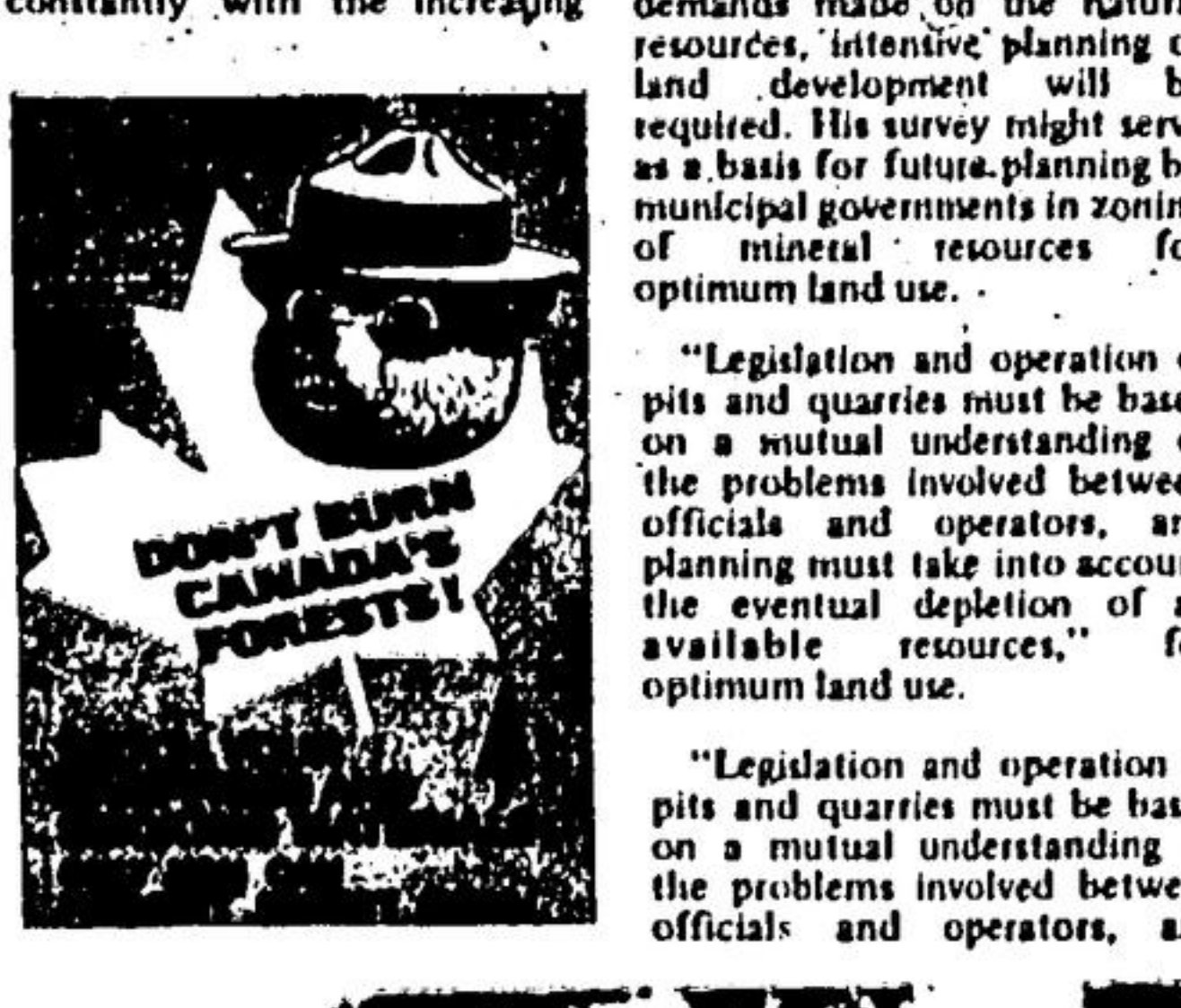
BELT UP

A survey by a Swedish automaking firm supports the theory that shoulder harnesses are effective, says the Hamilton Automobile Club. The company's figures show that injuries were reduced by 73 per cent for drivers and 83 per cent for passengers who used harnesses. The study also showed that none of the 19,345 persons who wore combined shoulder-lap belts were fatally injured in crashes at speeds up to 60 miles per hour.

Says mutual understanding answer to quarry problem

The competing needs of the construction industry in the "Golden Horseshoe" area on the one hand, and the aesthetic requirements of the general population on the other are studied objectively in a recent report of the Ontario Department of Mines. The publication release was announced by the Minister of Mines, Hon. Allan F. Lawrence.

An Industrial Mineral Report No. 31, "Stone Resources of the Niagara Escarpment", Dr. M. A. Vos points out that by 1966 the production of structural materials in the Toronto-Hamilton area had risen to \$82.2 million, a five-fold increase over the production in 1950. The requirements are rising constantly with the increasing

planning must take into account the eventual depletion of all available resources", according to Dr. Vos.

The report is available from the Publications Office of the Department of Mines in Toronto at a cost of \$2.

The study was instituted at the request of the quarry operators' section of the Ontario Mining Association. In summarizing his findings, Dr. Vos says that the beauty and recreational potential of the Niagara Escarpment must be protected and, in order to integrate these facilities with the demands made on the natural resources, intensive planning of land development will be required.

Second vocational school to be located in Oakville

The County's second special vocational school will be located in Oakville, members of the Board of Education decided.

The special vocational school, scheduled for opening in 1972, will be like General Brock School now located in Burlington.

Trustee Lawson suggested the area that could be served from a more central location was not just that above the Base Line, but could include north Oakville and north Burlington.

Georgetown Trustee E. Bodner spoke in favor of the school being located in the Milton area to accommodate growth since the whole county but not necessarily accessible. He questioned if the school should not be further north to be more central with the next school foreseen in 1976 or 1977 located in the area of growth.
