3,980 pets at rabies clinics

The Health of Animals Branch of the Canada Department of Agriculture has released the figures for the recent rabies vaccination clinics held in Halton County June 9 to June 13. Under the two categories 2,736 dogs were vaccinated and 1,244 cats were given protection.

In Nassagaweya Township, 102 dogs and 29 cats were done; 199 dogs and 93 cats in Milton; 74 dogs and 40 cats at Kilbride; 606 dogs and 331 cats in Burlington; 96 dogs and 49 cats in Hornby; 349 dogs and 162 cats in Georgetown; 179 dogs and 60 cats in Palermo; 877 dogs and 416 cats at Trafalgar and 254 dogs and 64 cats in Acton.

"No end in sight" reports Halton M.P.

"No end in sight", was how M.P. Rud Whiting described prospects on Parliament Hill for a summer recess in an interview with this paper Friday morning.

"The mood up here has changed considerably since we went into overtime sessions," the Halton M.P. reported.

Commenting on the adjournment the previous night, because of the absence of a quorum, Mr. Whiting emphasized the adjournment camp in the private members' hour. Leader of the Opposition Robert Stanfield was the only Progressive Conservative in the house, the Liberal ranks were down and when the N.D.P. saw the low count they dispatched some of their members to further reduce the number present. The result was the adjournment for lack of a quorum.

The Halton M.P. acknowledged that he was also absent at the time attending a meeting of the Ontario caucus. "I have to be truthful about it, I want'three either," he admitted.
