Campbellville record stands to 10 wins

Veteran Harry Hamilton and Jack Roberts combined to hold Georgetown to three runs on Sunday afternoon as their teammates were scoring 10 off Mike Tost and Bernie Dore. The win gave Campbellville a season's record of 10 wins against five losses. They have won seven of their last nine games.
Hamilton went five innings for Campbellville. He was replaced by Roberts after walking the first two men in the sixth. In the full five innings, Hamilton gave up three runs off two hits. He struck-out five walked seven and hit one batter. Roberts shut-out Georgetown in four innings of relief pitching. He allowed four hits; struck-out two. In six innings losing pitcher Tost gave up eight runs off nine hits. He struck-out five and walked nine. In two innings of relief, Dore, allowed two runs off four hits. He struck out two.
Georgetown took a 1-0 lead in the first inning. Maloney doubled with two out. Hamilton struck-out Arbic for what should have been the third out but the ball got away from Campbellville catcher Doug Lang and his throw to first glanced off the winners' helmet and Maloney scored from second. Georgetown made it 2-0 in the top of the fifth. Dinmore walked and was sacrificed to second. Two more walks pushed him to third from where he scored on an infield out.
Campbellville finally came to life in the bottom of the fifth. Lang was safe on an error and

then on an attempted double play Arbic made a two base error to put men on second and third. Dredge then tripled in two runs and McPhail walked. Bill Currie doubled but was caught off second and McPhail scored in the resulting run-down. Jordan then doubled, was sacrificed to third and scored the fifth run of the inning on a double by Dennis.
Hamilton walked the first two batters in the top of the sixth and then Dinmore beat out a punt off Roberts to load the bases. Georgetown then squeezed home one run to make it 5-3 for Campbellville. In the bottom of the sixth Dredge doubled and scored on Jordan's single to make it 6-3.

To open the bottom of the seventh Andrews was safe on an error and two walks loaded the bases. Andrews was forced at the plate but hits by Moore, Dredge and Inglis drive in four runs to make it 10-3 for Campbellville. This completed the scoring for the afternoon.

Deaf athletes leaving Friday

Acton public school students have a special interest in the World Games for the Deaf, which begin soon in Yugoslavia. Their walkathon last spring raised money to help finance the trip for deaf Ontario youngsters.
Six athletes from the Ontario School for the Deaf at Milton will arrive Friday in Belleville for final days of training before flying to Yugoslavia on July 30.
Dennis Snider, a teacher at the school, will accompany the six youngsters. Linda Russell, 14, Greg Crookford, Mike Smith and Bill Whyte, all 18, will compete in track and field events. Brian Dymond, 19, and Wai Ming Seto, 19, are on the volleyball team.
It's to be the first plane trip for most of them, and the first time in Europe for all of them.
The Federation of the Silent Sports of Canada organized and sponsored the Canadian team.
Over 300 walkers from Acton joined 100 from Milton in the 32-mile trek to raise \$5,500 early in May.
