August 11, Custom Cleaners 12, Nellis Construction 7.

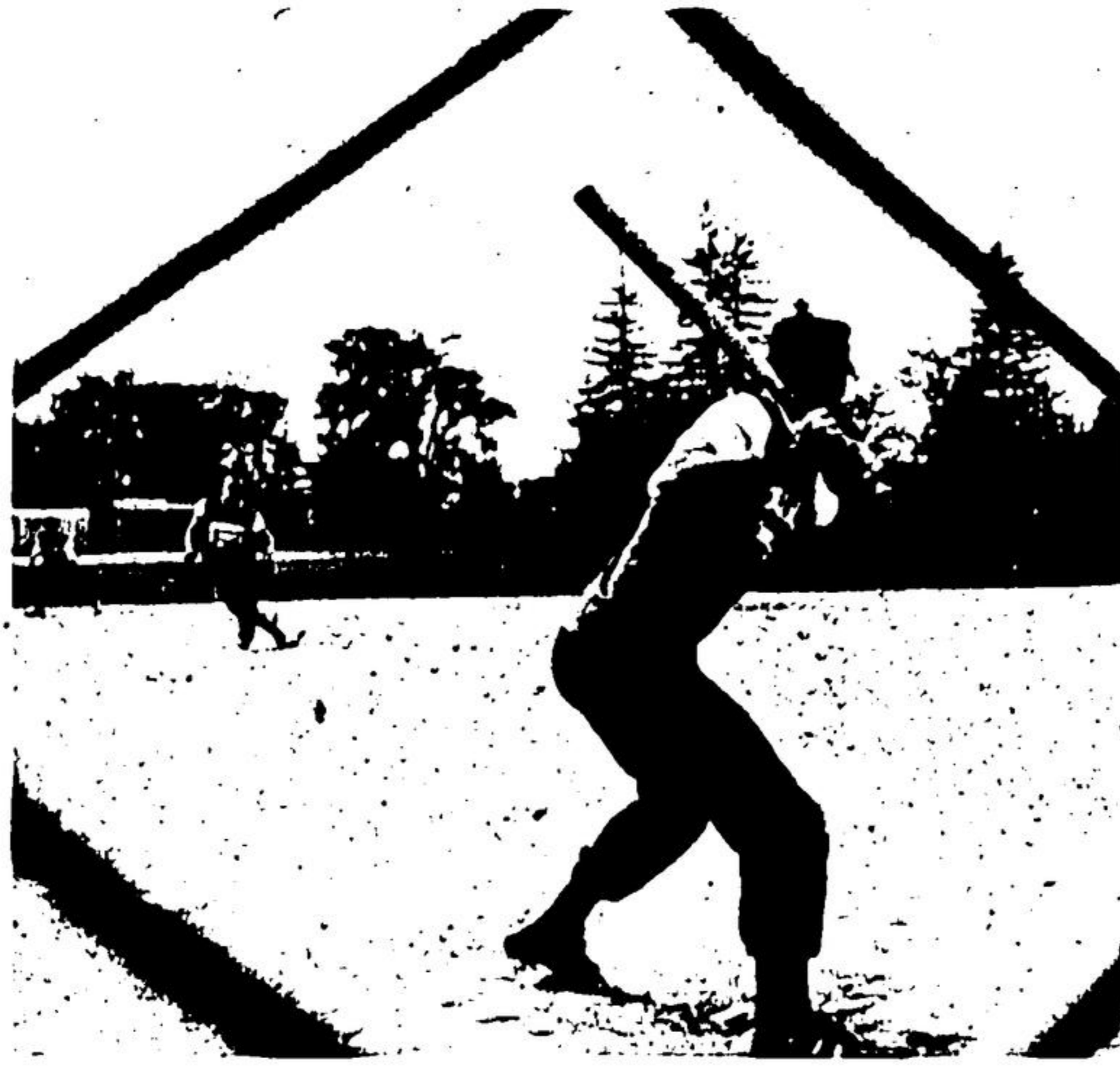
In a playoff to decide second place, Custom Cleaners downed Nellis Construction 12-7 behind the eight-strikeout pitching of Jim Hurley.
