At their first regular meeting since the early part of July, Acton Council Tuesday evening:

• Read and passed a by-law executing a subdivider's agreement between Monex Construction and the town. Council also passed a resolution confirming that they would adhere to the original agreement with the company which insisted on a performance bond. The company notified No. 1 committee that it was having difficulty raising the performance bond on short notice and suggested the town take the deeds over for lots in lieu of the bond so the project wouldn't be held up. Monex proposes to build 23 houses on Churchill Rd. North.

• Agreed to advertise for a plumbing inspector following the breakdown of negotiations between the five municipalities in North Halton to make the inspection service a joint concern.

• Passed a resolution authorizing the clerk to engage a solicitor to prepare a by-law to close Division St. in Warren Grove.

• An application from Lake Manor Holdings Ltd. for amendments to the official plan and zoning by-law to accommodate a "neighborhood plaza" consisting of nine stores with 16 living suites above on Lots 248 and 247 at 133 Main St. north was referred to Planning Board while the initial application has been dealt with.

• Acton Recreation Committee was authorized to proceed with the installation of brine header pipes at the community centre. Cost of replacing the worn-out pipes is \$2,200 which the committee had not budgeted for in the 1969 estimates.

• Authorized Mayor Les Doby to sit on the executive of the Ontario Mayors and Reeves with expenses paid. Councillor Marks was opposed to the resolution wording claiming there should be a limit on expenses.
