## Erin tower wearing green

ERIN—Erin's new water reservoir has been put into service, and according to town foreman, George Sweeney, is working very satisfactorily.

The water tower has been painted an appropriate light green, and inscribed "Erin" in darker green letters, making an attractive appearance at the top of the treed hill behind the village.

At night, the tower is a welcome beacon, brightly flood-lit with a glowing red light on top.

## Climax wild ride — rail

GEORGETOWN—A 20 year old driver who sped through Limehouse at 75 miles per hour almost locking down a man and a small child and forcing another car off the road was sentenced in county court last week to seven days' hard labor, fined \$300 and lost his license to drive for one year.

When he was sentenced, his young wife broke into tears and was led sobbing from the courtroom followed by the young man's lawyer.

During the high-speed ride March 27, the Rockwood resident was pursued by Ontario Provincial Police constable Jim Hodson who chased him for more than seven miles before stopping him outside Acton.

The pursued car travelled at speeds of more than 95 miles per hour, swerved from shoulder to shoulder and went through a stop sign at one point, the officer told Judge Kenneth M. Langdon.

On the stand, the accused said he did not see the officer's roof light on during the chase and thought the car behind him contained some youths he had had trouble with in Georgetown.

He admitted to Crown Attorney Douglas Latimer of dragging down a street in Georgetown before the chase. He admitted drag racing another car two abreast at 60 miles per hour through a 30 mph zone.

## Family burnt out of house

GEORGETOWN—A Georgetown area family lost their possessions when fire burned their rented cottage to the ground. The blaze started in a barn located next to the R.R. 3 Georgetown home of Mr. and Mrs. Wilgard Dugay. The barn was also levelled.

The barn and cottage, on the Stewarttown Sideroad, a mile east of that village, were part of farm property owned by Miss Theresa St. Jean.

The Dugays managed to flee the small house just before it was consumed by flame.

Their two small children were in a friend's house at the time. Dugay is out of work after suffering an arm injury at his previous job.

Georgetown branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society put the family up at a Brampton motel and supplied them with clothing.

## Ambulance service in Milton

MILTON—Milton will soon have its own ambulance service, based at Milton District Hospital and offering 24 hour service to the community and surrounding area.

An official at Milton District Hospital announced Friday the hospital will establish a local ambulance service after completing a careful assessment of the needs of the community, the future population growth and the close proximity of several provincial highways.

"The Board felt it would be to the benefit of the citizens to have this essential service available at the hospital," he said.

A fully equipped ambulance will be based at the Milton Hospital and will be available for emergency calls around the clock. The ambulance will be operated by trained drivers and attendants who will be full time employees of the hospital.

## Visitor from the sky

BURLINGTON—When her cat started pawing at something on the lawn of their Four Sideroad, Burlington home, Mrs. Doug Forschner thought it might have caught a mouse and went to investigate.

She got a surprise when she saw it was just a brown rock. But something looked funny about this rock so she took it in the house and washed the dirt off it.

It was a meteorite, at least she believes it to be a meteorite until some expert proves her wrong.

The rock, measuring about six inches across and about two inches deep, tipped a set of scales at two pounds and certainly matched descriptions of meteorites found in current encyclopedias.

The rock was scarred with holes and several streaks of white stone ran through the centre of the stone. It must have fallen during the week, Mrs. Forschner said, as she had cut the grass a few days earlier and it wasn't there then.

## Hold inquest into drowning

A coroner's inquest will be held into the drowning last month of a 27-year-old Toronto man who lost his life in five feet of water at Waterfalls Playground, near Limehouse.

Notice of the inquest was given by the Halton Crown Attorney's office.

Flavio Vuletic of Weston, an unmarried electrician, was known to his friends as a good swimmer. He had swam in the area, an abandoned quarry filled with water, on previous occasions.

North Halton provincial police who were called to the drowning feel Vuletic may have suffered severe cramps just before drowning. He had eaten dinner shortly before, they said.

An inquest may also be held into the death of Edward DeBoer, 18, of north Oakville, who drowned in Kelo Lake just north of Milton last month three days before the Vuletic drowning.

The youth, a grade 10 student at White Oaks Secondary School in Oakville had gone to the lake in the Kelo Conservation area with a Milton church youth group.
