Curling Cuos

 An executive meeting of the Acton Curling Club was held on Tuesday, August 19 at the site of the new building to examine progress to date and discuss general planning of the front layout.

The meeting moved to the office of Goy Cartage to discuss further financing required to obtain a mortgage of \$50,000. An effort is being made by the executive members to obtain an additional \$25,000 backing to bring the total to \$100,000, the requirement necessary to permit the finance committee to arrange the \$50,000 mortgage. This must be completed by Monday, August 25 for further progress to be made on the

building. If any curler has not yet visited the building site, I would strongly recommend he do so because the work is progressing very rapidly and visible changes are being made every working day. Also, potential curlers who have waited for a curling club building will see for themselves that there will be curling time available seven days a week this season.

Hear playground report plan winter program

Playground supervisor Don Price presented his report to Acton Board of Parks Management and Recreation Committee at their monthly meeting at the public library, Thursday night.

Mr. Price reported that there were 150 children enrolled in the playground program and 110 children enrolled in swimming classes during the summer. He attributed the success of the program to the co-operation he received from local merchants and businesses, who made donations.

Children raised approximately \$100 themselves on such events as a car wash, penny carnival and spook house. The money raised was used to finance bus trips.

In his report Mr. Price mentioned that he would probably need \$2,000 for salaries and \$450 for supplies in order to operate next year's program. He told the board that many of this year's playground leaders would not return next summer if they did not receive more money.

Board member Wilf Duval noted that he had heard more compliments about the playground this year than ever before.

Councillor Peter Marks expressed the Board's appreciation to Mr. Price for the fine job he did.

Mr. Marks, program committee chairman, said that he would like to see night school classes started again this winter. He also asked the Board to

consider inviting any clubs in town to use recreational facilities at Acton schools if they first applied to the recreation committee for permission.

The Halton County Board of Education will supply free use of school facilities to the recreation committee this year. In return schools will be permitted to use the facilities at the community centre, free of charge.
