**Hope to have ice ready in October**

Parks and arena manager Harold Townsley told Acton Recreation Committee Thursday night that ice would probably be installed in the community centre in October.

Monday and Tuesday nights will be available for hockey or skating this year since the Acton Curling Club will be moving into their own rink on Churchill Road. The board's program committee is to hold an open meeting in the near future to hear applications for ice times. Mr. Townsley asked the board to consider increasing the size of the snack bar in the community centre. He felt that under present conditions his staff could not give patrons of the snack bar proper service. The property committee is to look into this. The snack bar made a net profit of \$132.84 during the month of July.

Mr. Townsley also reported thieves had made off with \$81. in a break-in at the community centre in July and that the handle on the fountain, which has been installed in the park recently was stolen.

The annual roller marathon will likely be held in September and there is a chance that professional wrestling will return the same month.

out if the board would have the authority to enforce such a by-law.

\* Instructed secretary Doris Townsley to send a letter to Acton Hydro Commission, suggesting the removal of a hydro pole in the community centre parking lot.

**\$3,700 per day for county school buses**

When school opens next Tuesday buses will be covering 7,708 miles a day to transport 9,861 pupils to Halton schools.

The report of the transportation for the school year was presented to members of the Halton Board of Education last Thursday noting a daily transportation bill of \$3,715.50 for the buses that will travel 228 routes.

**Police recover stolen goods**

Constable Bruce McArthur of Acton O.P.P., together with police from the North Halton detachment O.P.P., executed a search warrant at a house on Guelph Street recently and uncovered a sizable quantity of stolen goods.

Acting on information he had received from Constable Nick Farion, who was off duty at the time, Constable McArthur and the North Halton police found 43 cartons of cigarettes, 149 packages of cigarettes, an amplifier, a microphone, a car tape recorder and 23 stereo tapes for the tape recorder.

One local person was charged with possession of stolen property.

The goods were found to have been stolen in the Metro Toronto area. A number of break and enter cases in Metro have been cleared up as a result of the search.

**Board foots the bill**

Transportation costs for French language students from the Georgetown area attending the special school at York Mills Collegiate, will be paid by the Halton Board of Education, members agreed Thursday.

Transportation from Burlington for French language students, will not be provided unless they can make connection with the bus going from Georgetown.

The Board had earlier agreed to pay the tuition fees of the students. It is expected 28 students will be attending from the Georgetown area to receive academic instruction in all subjects in French.

The estimated cost of the transportation is \$7,200 for the year of which the board cost, after the grant is deducted, would be \$3,672.

There will be a total of 23 other high school students from Halton who will be obtaining their education outside the county. Nineteen of these will attend high schools in Guelph. They will be permitted to complete their education there but no new students will be entering the program.

**Combat flying exhibition to be held here Sunday**

Model airplane enthusiasts from Toronto, Detroit, Cincinnati, Ohio and Ithaca, New York will be competing in the Acton Combat Exposition, at Prospect Park, on Sunday. The event is being held by the local club, Acton Hi Flyers, under the auspices of the Acton Chamber of Commerce.

The Exposition is sanctioned by the Model Aeronautics Association of Canada and should attract a large crowd. A reception in the form of a corn roast and barbecue is being held at Smallwood Acres, Saturday night. All visitors are welcome at the reception.
