Resident says odor makes him retch

Dear Sir: For the third summer since I settled in Acton, I and my neighbours are plagued by a most offensive odor that arises around sunset on a hot, humid evening and continues in spasmo throughout the night.

Things have again reached the stage where it is sometimes impossible to sit in the garden because of the stench and at bedtime, one is forced to close all windows before retiring. You can imagine trying to sleep in an airless room at about 82 degrees fahrenheit.

Sometimes, if we are unwise enough to risk leaving the windows open on going to bed, almost envariably we are awakened in the wee small hours by a room full of vile smell. We are then faced with the alternative of closing all windows before going to the bathroom to vomit, or vice

Although no part of Acton totally escapes, the concentration of smells seems to be in the Churchill-Longfield area. I have noticed sometime that when the smell is unbearable outside my house I can walk 100 yards up Churchill or Longfield and find the air almost breathable. For, perhaps for topographic reasons on a calm night our corner and the

apartment site literally reeks. Zoning the dump area for apartments was a most moronic decision by our planning board and the fact that council allowed the apartments to be built was equally stupid. To condemn upwards of 200 people to live in apartments in one of the smelliest areas in Ontario was in

my opinion, morally criminal. The stock answer to that is, of course, "No one is forced to live there," just as I was told by a senior Acton official after I had complained of something-"you can always move."

Unfortunately, while moving might solve my problem, it does nothing to alleviate the problem of our air pollution. A great deal

of time and money is being spent on anti-pollution measures these days and also on public health measures.

The Medical officer of Health for Halton County last year defined our pollution in approximately these words: "Any emission that causes discomfort to man or beast."

This problem is, I feel in both areas, particularly public health. Imagine a sick person or a tiny baby being forced to either sleep in smells reminiscent of a cesspool or alternatively, to swelter in a room with all windows closed on a hot humid summer night. I am in excellent health and I can't stand it.

Three summers ago in a letter published in this paper, I asked the mayor for a statement on the source of the pollution and what was being done to eliminate it. That statement, of course, was never made.

Today, I am again asking that the mayor or his spokesman issue a statement in the Acton Free Press next week regarding this pollution and again, what is being done about it, just to put

Eye Specialists

1. Oculist—an eye doctor or ophthalmologist, usually confines practice to medical and surgical treatment of eye conditions, vision testing, eye muscle exercises and prescription of glasses. Some eye doctors also specialize in ear, nose and throat.

2. Optometrist - a nonmedical graduate of a college of optometry licensed test vision, prescribe and fit glasses and treat optical and eye muscle defects without drugs or surgery. An optician is a skilled technician who grinds lenses to prescription and fits eye glasses. He does not test vision unless he is also an optometrist.
