## Sell lots to residents — dep. reeve

Deputy Reeve Ted Tyler proposed that council should retain about 50 per cent of municipally-owned land and sell it to residents who have been in Acton for several years, during the enquiry session at last week's council meeting. "Acton is landlocked with speculators and developers," the deputy-reeve told council, "and it is impossible for a man to buy a lot. It forces people to go to the land developers."

"You can't buy a lot in Acton or outside town, Mr. Tyler maintained. "It is all controlled by developers."

He asked No. one committee to consider holding over half the town-owned lots and pre-sell them to Acton people who might want to purchase ones. "There would be no debentures for sewer and water on a scheme like this," the deputy-reeve declared, "and the town could still reap a good profit."

The deputy-reeve suggested that residents with 15 years or more residence would get first choice, then the 10 year residents, then five years and so on until the land was sold. He said the municipality should forbid the buyer to resell for a certain period to avoid the possibility residents would just act as go between for buyers who weren't eligible.

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
