

A BUILDING AIM FOR ACTON

Text: Pr. 127:1: "Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it; except the Lord keep the city, the wetchmen wetcheth but he vain."

Life on earth may be terminated untimely by accident, calamity or self destruction, but while we are living, let us face the fact that we are "all born in sin and thapen in iniquity." Pr. 51:5, Rom. 5:12. Sin causes suffering; all of the crime, disease and suffering against the moral, physical and mental well being of man may be summed up in one word-SIN. "If thou doest not well, then sin lieth at the door." It was in Eden, the cradle of the race,

that Satan struck the blow that laid man's plory in the dust. It was in Eden that Satan uncapped the volcano of selfishness to belch its death and destruction on mortals ever since. It was in Eden sin began the hellish work that has marred the pages of all history. It is ain that robs virtue of its charms, invades happiness, murders sanctity and destroys hope. Sin is debauching, debasing and defiling. It is false, foul and filthy. It is the cause of cruelty, crime and corruption. It is the cause of riot, revelry and ruin. The story is told of a certain man who married and begat a family. Turning from God, he set himself to build that family in his own way. First he surrounded them with wealth, beautiful home and luxuries. He educated them and created social contacts for them. He indulged them in the riotous life of the modern world.

They sinned grossly, far beyond anything he knew! They squandered his money and his home had to be put under the auctioneer's gavel.

He lay sick unto death in a top-storey room. Hearing the commotion of the sale, he sought to inquire and making his way downstairs he was shocked, and the shock cost him his life. In a dying clutch he grasped a piece of tapestry hanging on the balcony and in the midst of the splendor of that which he had reared without God, but which was now ashes at his feet, he fell dead. The last convulsed grip jerked the tapestry from its place, and revealed a bronze tablet to the horrified gaze of the onlookers, transfixed by the tragedy being enacted before them.



Board ups ice rental for intermediates

Acton Board of Parks Management and Recreation Committee voted Thursday night to charge the intermediate hockey team a flat rate of \$12 hour for ice rental this year instead of maintaining the 60-40 gate split agreeement that has existed between the two

organizations in past years. On the basis of the 60-40 gate split agreement Councillor Peter Marks estimated the intermediates paid an average of about six to eight dollars an hour for ice over the last three years. Mr. Marks admitted that the intermediates had experienced an unusually poor year at the gate and that in previous "bumpe crop" years




