Must stop for bus if lights flashing

The Hamilton Automobile Club advises motorists they need only stop for a school bus when the red lights are flashing on the vehicle. These are the brilliant red flashers at the top of the bus, front and back.

Bus drivers will flash their lights when stopped on highways having a speed limit in excess of 35 m.p.h. motorists must stop when approaching or overtaking a school bus with lights flashing.

When overtaking a bus on a divided highway, motorists must stop. However, when approaching a bus from the front on a divided highway only, the motorists are not required to stop but are cautioned to slow down.

A divided highway was recently defined in the Highway Traffic Act as a strip of pavement more than 10 feet in width, an unpaved strip of
