### ACTON MIXED

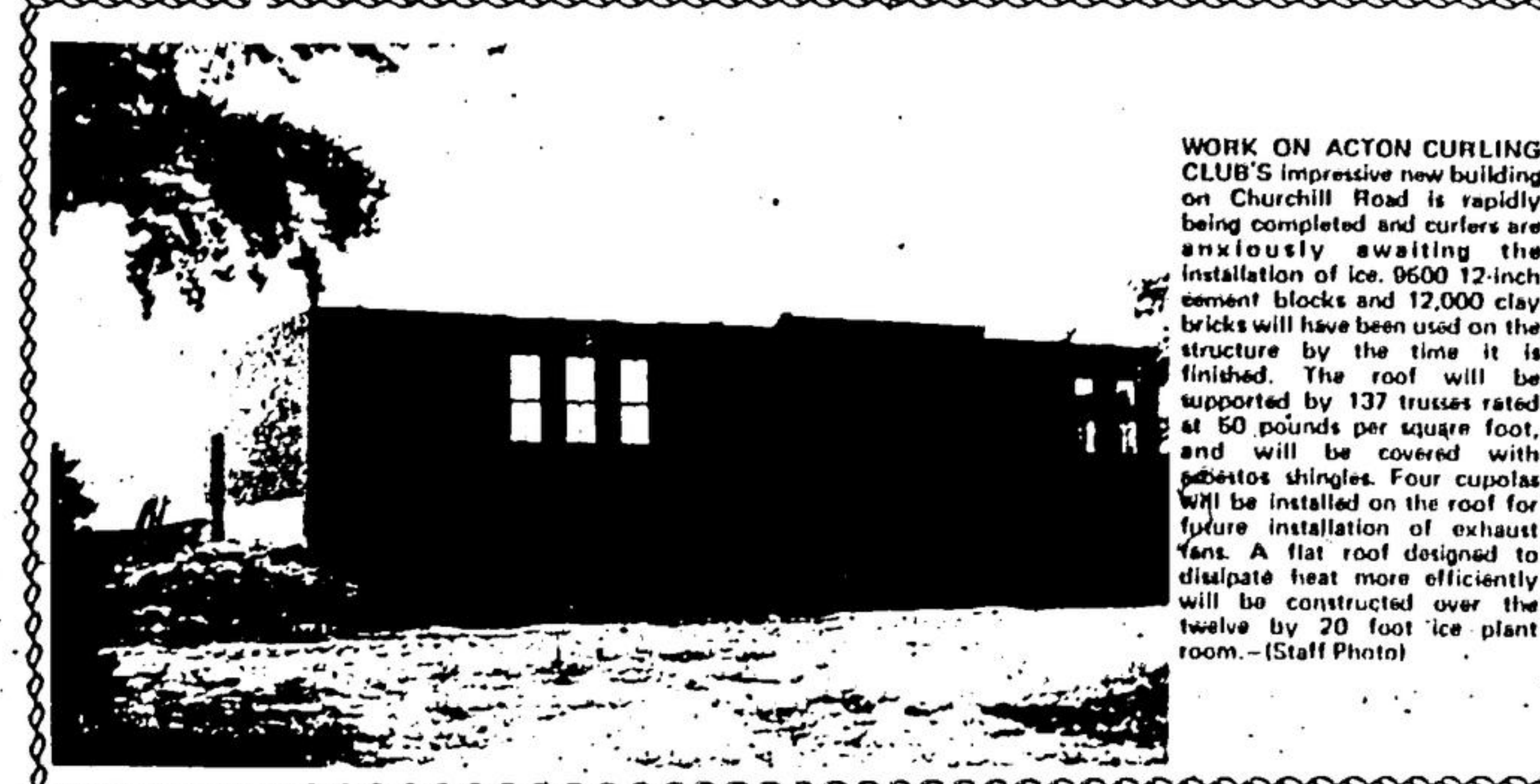

## Another delay for the Official Plan

Acton Council will request the Minister of Municipal Affairs to delete a proposed amendment to the official plan in order to release the by-law and speed up delivery from the Department.

The amendment which would change the Dills Printing and Publishing property behind the Willow St. plant to M1 as recommended by an Ontario Municipal Board hearing, has been disputed by the planning section of the Department of Municipal Affairs.

the owners could use it for their purposes. The amendment, one of several the O.M.B. ruled on and rejected by planners in the Department of Municipal Affairs.

Council discussed the latest delay with mounting consternation. "We've got to get going. Otherwise we'll never get the senior citizens' housing off the ground," said the deputy-reeve. Councillors failed to grasp why the Dills property was picked out when A.P. Green and Beardmore and Co. properties are both zoned industrial with no problems and the same watercourse goes through.

This latest development which has left council "banging heads against a wall" originated from conservation authorities who claim the defined area could be subject to flooding and should not be zoned industrial.

"The town goes along with the recommendations of the Ontario Municipal Board and the Department does not agree," the mayor said. "Now we're sitting between the Board and the Department."

The O.M.B. hearing ruled that unless the town was prepared to acquire the land within a reasonable length of time then

It was agreed that the quickest way to solve the dilemma would be to ask the Department to delete the Dills amendment from the by-law and ask for release of the balance of the Official Plan of Acton. The portion affecting the Dills property will be sent to Acton Planning Board for their recommendations.

"It's a Planning Board matter," councillors agreed.
