Company capitulates bows to Department

Acton Council rescinded last week's motion and passed another accepting the modifications to the town's official plan as proposed by the Department of Municipal Affairs on the Dills Printing and Publishing Company property, following receipt of a letter from

the company Thursday night. Dills Printing scknowledged it was a frustrating experience attempting to resolve and clarify the land use designation being forced on the property by the Ontario government. . The company indicated it was not prepared to mount the necessary legal battle and had no recourse but to capitulate and accept the terms as laid down by the Department, even though they are contrary to the proposal of the town and planning board and a decision of the Ontario

Municipal Board. The Department of Municipal Affairs concurred with recommendation from the Conservation authorities that the hand along the rear of the Dills property on Willow St. should not be zoned industrial unless

Conservation authorities the creek traversing the Dills property presents a defined area now susceptible to flooding.

This flood area, according to the authorities, could be flooded in the event of the occurrence of the one in 50 year storm centred over the contributory watershed. They recommended a "Conservation" designation along the alignment of the creek with the implementing zoning

by-law establishing a 40 foot setback requirement from the line indicating the limits of the flood prone area. Council first passed a motion at a special meeting last week asking that the Dills property amendment be deleted from the Official Plan and that the

Department release the balance of the plan. Following receipt of the letter from Dills Publishing capitulating to the demands from the Department, council rescinded the original resolution in favor of one accepting the recommendations.

The company stated it had serious doubts about the necessity of local planning when it can be superceded by Department officials but also emphasized they did not wish to delay further proceedings on the long-delayed amendment.

"If and when the official plan is ever amended or reviewed again, we expect the balance of the stream will be dealt with in the same way as that section in our ownership is now being restricted," the letter concluded. A hearing of the Ontario Municipal Board last year ruled that unless the town was prepared to acquire the land within a reasonable length of time the owners could use it for the purposes they saw fit.
