A generous offer by team sponsors, Beardmore and Co. has encouraged the local intermediate hockey executive to go shead with plans to keep Acton Tanners in the O.H.A. for at least another

The executive, consisting of a few energetic souls, interested in keeping Intermediate hockey alive in Acton had encountered nothing but obstacles in their efforts, until last week.

In the first place a disappointing season at the gate last year, caused the team to finish "in the red" financially and left them no money with which to start this year.

A fund-raising dance in September had just cleared up last year's. debts when the O.H.A. announced their decision to revert to the old system of using one referes and two lineamen in intermediate games this year, thus raising the probable cost of officials to the home club from \$20 to approximately \$40 a game.

Perhaps the biggest financial obstacle presented itself, when Acton Board of Parks Management and Recreation Committee decided to charge the club a flat rate of \$12 an hour for ice rental this year instead of maintaining the 60-40 gate split arrangement that has existed in past years. The actual change in financial) arrangements was not nearly as big a blow to the future of intermediate hockey in Acton as was the time at which it occurred.

The Board, in stating reasons for the change, pointed out the fact that on account of unusually low gates at intermediate games last winter, Tanners paid an average of about \$4 an hour for ice, on the 60-40 gate split agreement. Most members felt that the Tanners (should be paying at least the same hourly rate as the Industrial Hockey League. The Industrial League paid \$12 an hour last year.

I spree that it seems a little ridiculous for the intermediate bockey club to be paying only \$4 an hour for ice, when some minor bockey teams, even though they are subsidized to some extent by the Board, are still paying \$7.50 and \$10 an hour, however I feel there are reasons why the 60-40 gate split agreement should have been maintained at least for this season.

Last winter the team experienced consistently low gates for the first time since intermediate hockey returned to town in the early sixtles. Main reason for the low gates was the team's disappointing showing in their group, and their consequent failure to make the playoffs. Up until last season however, the Tanners always iced a contending hockey team, a team that represented the town of Acton well in hockey circles around the province. Local interest in the team was high and good crowds attended the Friday night home games. In these years, on the basis of the 60-40 gate split agreement an hour for ice.

I am not prepared to say that the Board had no valid reasons for discontinuing the 60-40 gate split agreemnt, nor am I accusing them of a "kick them when they're down policy", I simply feel that prospects of Acton having a contending team and attracting Georgetown entry.

The executive have managed to sign Russ Bowman, who has had previous intermediate coaching experience with both the Milton Merchants and Georgetown Raiders. The play of several homebrew rookies who played with the team last year should improve and the executive reports that chances of lining up a few top notch imports are very good.

With a contending team on the ice this year gate receipts would be bound to increase and there's always the possibility that both the intermediate hockey club and the Board could benefit from an extremely good year.

The series of all series' begins Saturday in Baltimore, when the hometown Orioles host the "miracle" Mets of New York in the first same of baseball's world series.
