As a young boy, Andy attended S. S. No. 10 Erin, Woodside School. Many times carried him on her back to school through the winter drifts for the Molozzi lived on the 4th line, Erin. A recent picture in a Toronto daily shows him with his colleagues and a model of the satellite which they designed and which has been aloft for seven years.

We glory in his ability and genius and feel very humble as a

loyal Canadian to know that he is using his brilliant mind for the good of Canada and for the world.

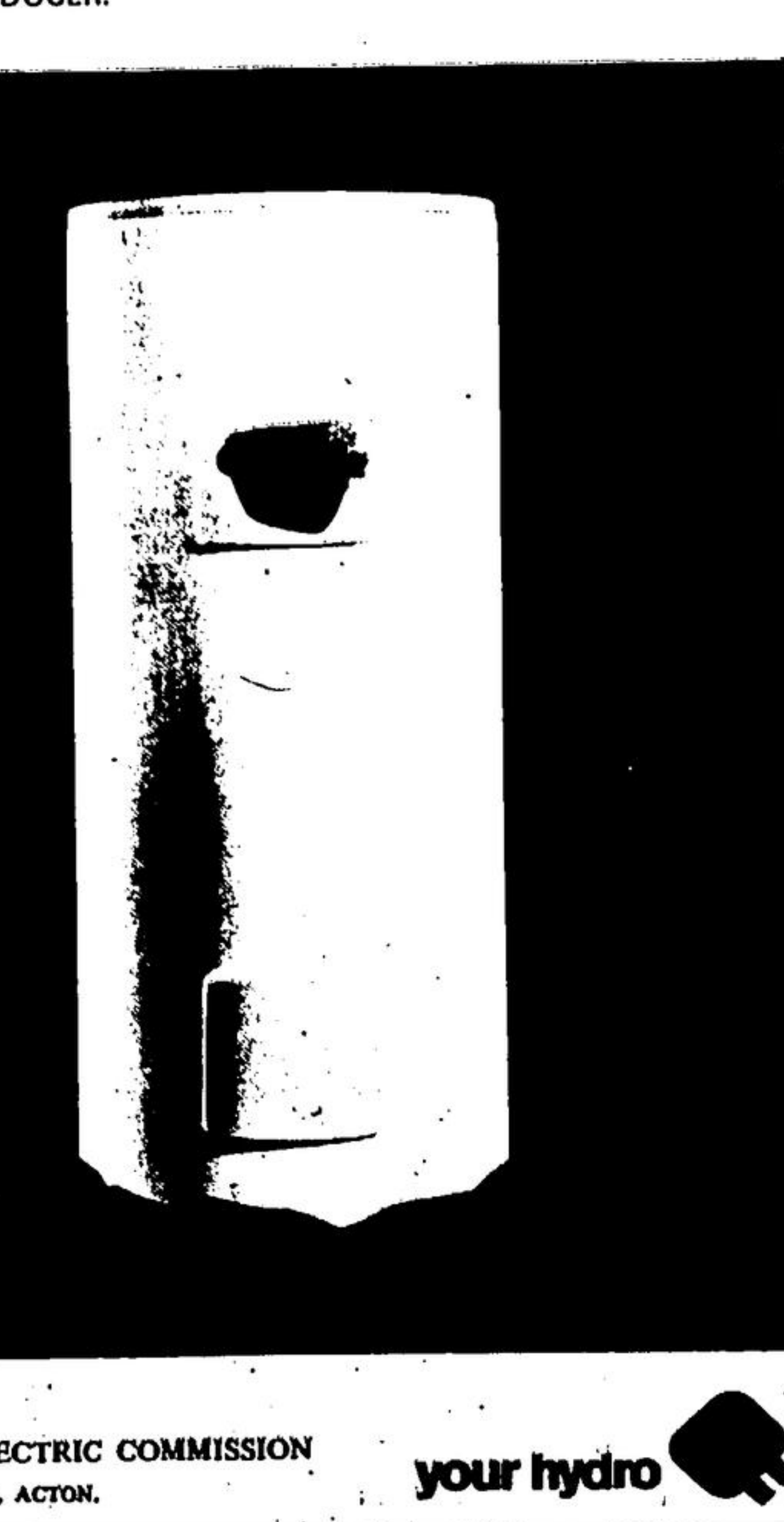
