Township refuses request for land separation

At their regular meeting Monday night, Esqueusing council passed a resolution that separation of land to F. David Thompson from R. Bruce Frame, where there is not 125 feet frontage on an established road, be refused.
Mr. Thompson had previously presented his request for a land separation to committee of adjustment, who referred the matter to council. At their October 6 meeting, council postponed a decision on the request until they had a chance to seek the advice of their solicitor and until a full council was present.
The township solicitor's report, read Monday night, suggested points that should be included in any agreement Mr. Thompson and Mr. Frame would draw up between themselves, so that the township would not be responsible at any time in the future for maintaining the right of way.
After listening to the township solicitor's report, Mr. Thompson told Council he and Mr. Frame were willing to draw up any agreement Council would like to ensure that the township would not be responsible for maintaining the right of way. He also added that they were willing to absorb the costs of having the township solicitor make his comments on such an agreement.
When Reeve George Currie

asked council for their decision, deputy-reeve Tom Hill answered, "Why should council make the decision on these proposals? Why shouldn't the committee of adjustment do it?"
Councillor Ken Marshall had an answer for the deputy-reeve. "In a similar instance", he pointed out, "they were asked not to grant separations without referring to Council".
Councillor Wilfrid Leslie said he could see no objection to the proposals as long as the proper documents were drawn up.
However, Councillor Marshall wondered how many others would approach council with similar requests in the future. He explained that perhaps the men involved in the present situation could afford to pay for a solicitor's comments, but wasn't sure others would be able to do it.
"You're coming dangerously close to having a law for the rich and a law for the poor", he contended.
Deputy-reeve Hill said he could see no harm in the proposals. Others requesting land separations of a similar nature in the future would have to abide by the same type of agreement.
"The only thing I see wrong with this is it would create a precedent", said the Reeve.
Councillor Marshall's subsequent resolution that the request be refused was carried.

ESQUEUSING Township Council

At their regular meeting Monday night Esqueusing Council:

- Gave first, second and third readings to and passed a by-law to permit United Gas to lay lines in lots two, three, four and five of concession two and lots three, four and five of concession three.
- Received a letter from the Central Ontario Regional Development Council asking the township for a response on their regional government questionnaire.
- Received a note complaining about conditions on No. 22 Sideroad, between Highway 25 and the fourth line and of the third line, between No. 22 Sideroad and the town of Acton, from residents of the area.
- Received a letter from the Rotary Club of Milton inviting any member of council interested to hear the Honorable Darcy McKeough speak on the subject of regional government.
- Received a letter from the Grand River Conservation Authority informing council that they would be sending under separate cover a map showing existing or proposed projects and asking for council's comments.
- Received a letter from the Halton County Board of Education to say that the Board had passed a motion that correspondence be established

with communities in the county, by which school facilities may be used for recreational purposes.

- Received a notice from the Ontario Humane Society expressing the opinion that Bill 194 which they claim would make all animals in public pounds and shelters in Ontario available for unrestricted, uncontrolled research, should be withdrawn.
- In answer to a request from Earl Jollymore of Data Key punching and Computer Service, council promised to request Guelph Hydro to speed up the installation of three phase power for the business. Mr. Jollymore explained to council that a new \$100,000 computer will be delivered there in February and that the installation of three phase power was very necessary for this.

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REPORT

During the week of Oct. 12-18 inclusive, members of the Ontario Provincial Police, Milton Detachment worked a total of 788 1/2 hours, and patrolled 7,301 miles on area roads under their jurisdiction. Traffic violations led to charges being laid against 38 persons. An additional 24 were issued warnings for less serious errors.

Officers responded to 37 personal occurrences during this time period. Included were three theft investigations, one of which was unfounded and one which involved a motor vehicle, four instances of breaking and entering, one disturbance, two complaints of wilful damage, two instances involving a total of five missing or lost persons. There were two complaints of hunters, one fraud investigation, one investigation under the Liquor Control Act which led to one person being charged, and one premise was found insecure on night patrol. The many other occurrences were of a minor nature and required little time to clear.

Traffic accidents requiring investigation numbered eight this week. Only one resulted in minor injury to one person and the remaining seven were property damage only. Total damage was estimated to be approximately \$4,360. Some of the causes were careless driving, driver lost control, and failing to stop at a stop sign. Two vehicles were damaged by fire. Investigation into the mishaps led to four motorists being summoned for appearance in Provincial Judge's Court.
