Fine program evolved for Girls' Auxiliary

The St. John's Anglican Girls' Auxiliary completed its fifth meeting this week on Monday, October 27, which had been designated as a "Pet Night" with Nancy Ingle as leader, assisted by Brenda Ingle and Christine Sinclair.

The organization which began in Rockwood approximately 12 years ago under the direction of Mrs. Gladys Slipp and Mrs. A. Ewers, as an endeavour for young Anglican girls, has grown up mentally to a point whereat it now embraces every Christian denominational body and is now comprised of girls between the ages of six to twelve years from the United, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, and Anglican churches, with a format of "The Kingdom Come" and a study of "Know Your Way Through your Bible" supplying the common ground of Christian fellowship with each child utilizing his own church's bible literature.

A tremendous program is prepared with stripes and badges comprising the goals worth striving for. Needle and handicrafts are worked into the program for the younger girls ranging from six to eight years for which they win merit stripes whereas the older girls win badges for their various achievements in nature study which includes everything from the study of leaves, birds, trees, etc. to ten mile hikes in the woods. Pet care is another of the five month courses for which the girls receive badge awards and also first aid, the latter of which requires a specialist in the nursing field who can qualify as an instructor.

Recreation, consisting of games and sing-songs, are also part of the yearly program promoting goodwill and christianity throughout the community.

Nancy Ingle, the present J. A. Leader, is a conscientious young girl who has participated in the group since its beginning but has headed it up only for the last two years when she took it over from Mrs. Flossie McMinn. She is proud of her group of 30 children and they, in turn, enjoy their leaders. The girls wear uniforms consisting of a skirt, blouse and beany which they wear to all the meetings and rent for a 50¢ per year fee which partly contributes to the costs of

New lighting, nominations, election on trustee agenda

The final costs of relighting on Main and Alma Streets (No. 7 Highway) showed a total cost of \$9,051.71, —\$445 over the original estimate but the Department of Highways have agreed to pay 50 per cent of this estimate.

It should be general knowledge that in a police village the trustees of that village are automatically the Public Utilities Commission as well as officials concerned with the operation of management and, in Rockwood's case, they comprise the Hydro Commission. Consequently, it is accepted that, at every regular Trustee meeting, the business is divided into two parts, that designated for hydro particulars and the other for general village management affairs.

The October meeting of the Rockwood Board of Trustees was held last Wednesday evening at the Rockwood Town Hall with Don Hiltz presiding as chairman, Trustees Ken Murray and John Herbert Smith present, and Charles O'Brien in his capacity as secretary.

The auditor's report on hydro business showed a net income of 12% over a nine month period and Rockwood is presently operating within its two year capital budget with three months more to go and 16%. Hydro accounts were then passed totalling \$3,543.07 for the current month of September.

The trustees then read and discussed a letter regarding sewage proposals with December 1, of the year 1971 set as the proposed date for installation. However, the letter was too late for a study to have been made on the financing of the project but a meeting is being arranged with the township council and the Ontario Water Resource Commission in this regard.

A by-law was then passed to hold nominations and elections for village trustees with the date of Friday, November 21, at the town hall, between 7:00 and 8:00 set as the time for nominations and December 1 as the general election date.

Following the nominations there will be a meeting for ratepayers whereat some of the township candidates and the local Rockwood candidates will have an opportunity to present their platforms and answer any questions.

The trustees further discussed their findings of their annual inspection of the Rockwood street lighting system, an annual occurrence in which the trustees inspect the village looking for unlighted areas. They requested that the Hydro install 250w mercury vapour lights in six locations where streets had been recently opened and where new housing warranted more lights. General accounts totalling

\$1,273 comprised of road accounts of \$244.90 and village accounts of \$1,028.10, were then passed for payment and the meeting was adjourned until Monday, November 24.
