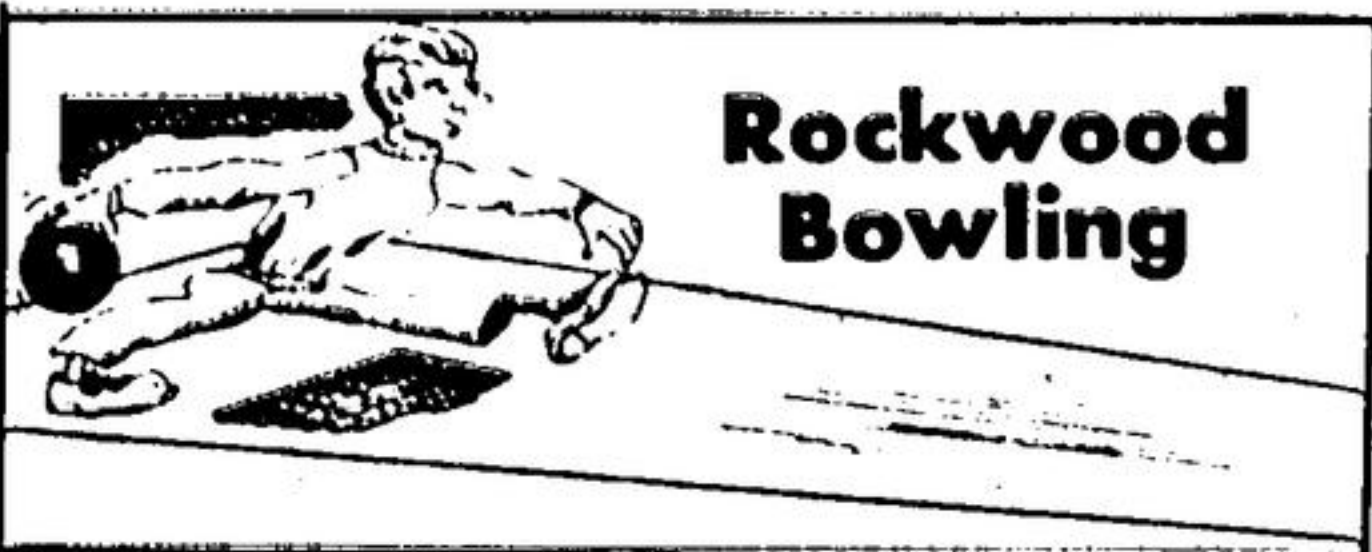

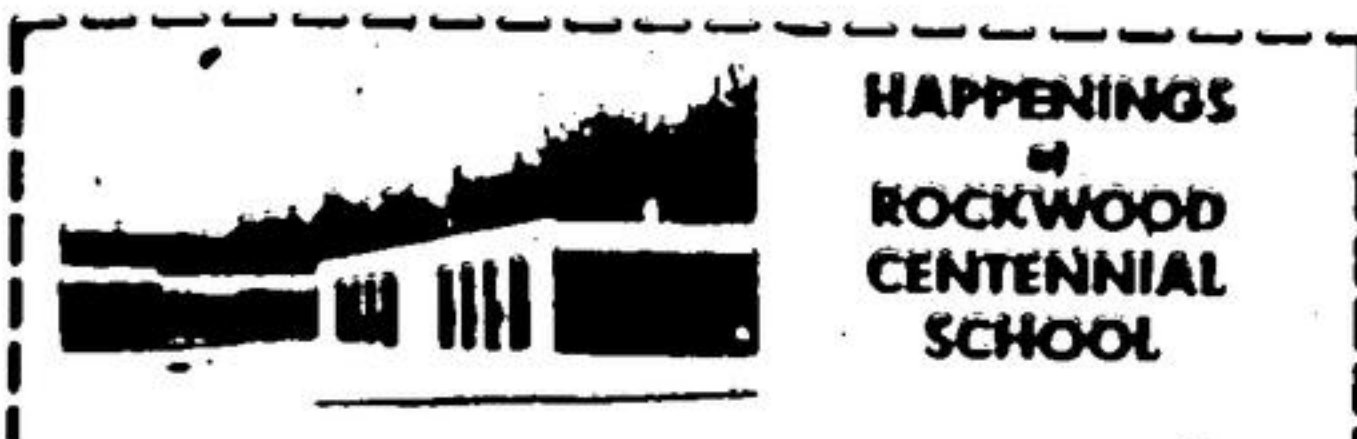
150 enjoy costume dance at town hall Saturday
