

Halton MP supports move to lower voting age to 18 _ raps cut-down in militia

Halton MP Rud Whiting expressed his wholehearted support for the government's move to lower the voting age to 18 in a speech to the House of Commons, Monday, Nov. 3.

"It is a recognition of youth and the part youth has played and is playing in the Canada of today and will play in the Canada of tomorrow," he said. "Youth has an interest in government.

A common sight in a new community called "Las Higueras," near Concepcion, Chile, is a "a paperback New Testament with a red, yellow and brown cover, popping up all over the place" says a report in an American Catholic magazine.

The book is the New Testament in "Popular" Spanish, published by the Bible Societies in Latin America and used and distributed by the Roman Catholic Church in the new community which has grown up around a steel mill.

Fifteen Bible groups, composed of a dozen people each, have been established and the members meet regularly for Bible Study. Teenagers also have another community in the parish, and they in turn minister to the younger children, using the same Version Popular New Testament.

The whole plan aims to develop and involve the community in the parish.

"Through the militia, as it was formerly called, thousands of young Canadians have over the years received important, useful training which has made them better citizens," said the Halton member.



A questionnaire prepared by Halton Liberal M.P. Rud Whiting disclosed that 70 per cent of those who answered thought the Official Languages Bill was one of the most important pieces of legislation for Canadian unity in years. Mr. Whiting released the results of his questionnaire at a dinner-dance in Oakville Friday

A majority of electors in Halton are opposed to leagalizing and controlling the sale and use of marijuana in Canada, the poll showed. Of the 82 per cent who expressed an opinion, 38 per cent turned thumbs down on the proposal. Twenty-two per cent agreed with legal use and control of the drug. Sixteen per cent were in partial agreement.

Fifty-two per cent of Halton Liberals who answered the poll were against a capital gains tax. The results of the questionnaire were made known the same day the Finance Minister announced a capital gains tax is scheduled to be applied in Canada in 1971. Fifty-six per cent were in favor of some form of price control but 50 per cent indicated they were against establishment of wage controls. Forty-eight per cent were infavor of a guaranteed annual income to replace present forms of welfare payments. Thirty-eight per cent were against the guaranteed income.

Sixty-eight per cent were in favor of legislation that would send family allowance cheques only to those below a specified income level.

A whopping 84 per cent want the government to spend more time on domestic problems and an even larger 88 per cent plumped for constitutional reform.

Seventy-six per cent think Canada should not discourage more foreign investment. Seventy-six per cent thought Canada's Indians should have aid even if it means raising taxes.

Both the Prime Minister and Rud Whiting got a whopping 80 per cent endorsement from the Halton Liberals, 350 of whom answered the questionnaire of 800 sent out.
