Originally associated only with the Marsden, Berry Hill and Mimosa Young people's group with a sporadic background of variation in membership and consistency for a number of years, the Stone Church and Rockwood Young Peoples' association has expanded to a membership of some 28 teenagers, ranging in age from 14 to 20 with membership including affiliates from the Anglican, Presbyterian, United and other churches.

Under the direction of Rev. Peter Tucker this keen group last year carried on a joint program of informative, worthwhile discussions on such topics as alcoholism, inter-personal boy girl relationships, drug addiction, local politics, and other topics, combined with social gatherings.

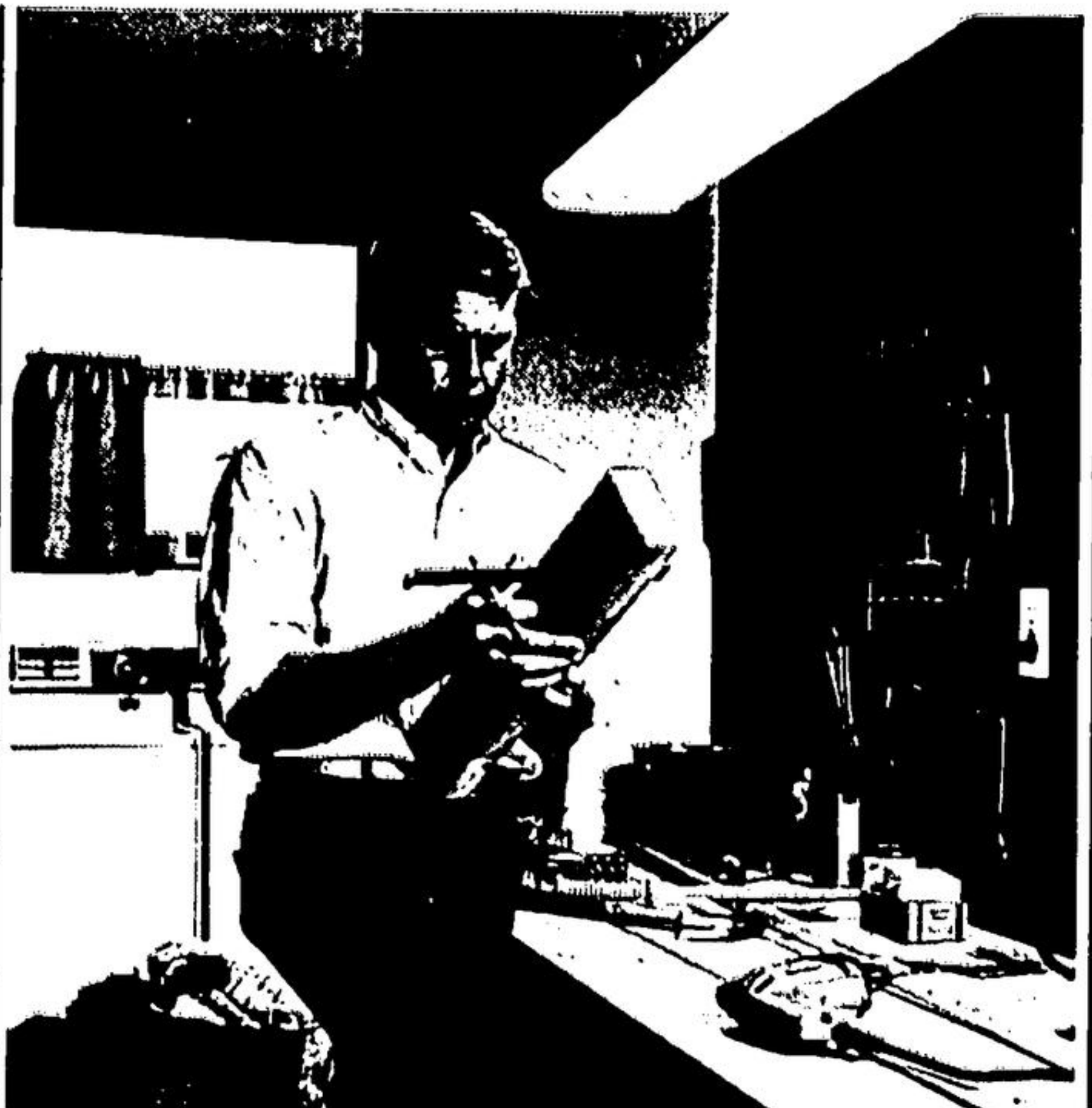
