Gladstone, when walking with a friend, came to a gate. The friend opened the gate and was leaving it open. Gladstone went back and closed the gate, saying he made it a habit in life to close gates behind him.

Robert Louis Stevenson, in his South Sea island home, was in the midst of family devotions when he left the room. His wife hurried after him to see if he were ill. He said, "I am not fit to pray the Lord's prayer." None of us is fit. If we are going to forgive, we have to see the reason why other people act as they do. Jeremiah, "I will forgive their iniquity and I will remember their sins no more."

Lloyd Douglas said, sometimes we are harder on people than we think we are. Girls in big department stores for example, receive any number of harsh remarks from hurried customers. Douglas said, when they have time off to go to the powder room, if it helps make them feel better, "Slap it on."

Emphysema odds high

Out of 100 smoking men 97 contain early warning signs of possible emphysema, according to a study cited in the Report of U.S. Public Health Service. The report places cigarette smoking as the most important agent in the development of pulmonary emphysema in man.

Ex-smokers lessen their chances of contracting the disease by almost 40 per cent. The study found warning signs of possible emphysema present in six out of 10 ex-smokers. The Canadian Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association reports that in Canada alone, there were a total of 1,852 deaths.
