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Scotch Block dam gets green light After being held up for a stated.

month due to a government regulation, construction of the Scotch Block dam and reservoir is expected to begin soon.

Bot Construction of Oakville was the company which received the go-shead to begin the work after submitting a bid of \$857,983.30, which includes bringing fill for the Esquesing dam across Highway 25 using SCIBBEIL.

The problem was a government ban on using the earth moving scrapers across Highway 2 7 unless a special permit was issued. This permit was not known about when Halton Region Conservation Authority officials let out the contract to be bid on.

Once they found out about the regulation, bids had to be revised to include the cost of using trucks to cart fill and a new date had to be found to announce acceptance of a final bid, Nov. 21.

Total cost of the project will be \$1,100,000 with 75 per cent of the funds coming from the provincial government and the rest of the money coming from local municipalities. All the land has been obtained by the Authority says resources manager Dave Murray, but the final price on three pieces of

land has not been finalized, he

The original estimate done in 1965 was to have the reservoir flood an area of 825 acres but this has risen to an area of 832 acres' which gives the Conservation Authority a mile and a half long take.
