# Organize Halton Hunters' Association conduct survey twp. land owners

At a meeting last week of a committee made up of representatives of the various outdoors clubs in Halton, it was

decided that the new organization be called the Halton Hunters' Association. Paul Coulson of the Halton Sportsmen's Association was

named the chairman and Jim Etherington was named secretary.

see if it is time this law should be enforced and if doing so would be feasible.

It was decided that a questionnaire be taken by members to all land owners in Esqueping and Nassagaweya townships. Each club will try to put a member on the job of distributing the questionnaires. Purpose of the questionnaires is to get the view of landowners in the areas in question so that the statistics can be presented to the local councils, along with a recommendation for a by-law that will regulate hunting sensibly.

It was also decided that these clubs and the Federation of Anglers and Hunters should be urged to apply to the Minister of Lands and Forests for the introduction of legislation that would make it mandatory for all persons applying for a hunting license to produce proof of liability insurance.

Once again there were two representatives present from the Department of Lands and Forests. Discussions revealed that there is a Trespass Law included in the Game and Fish Act, but that another section in the Act states conservation officers are not obliged to enforce the Trespass Act.

At a meeting held last night (Tuesday) the questionnaires were distributed to the various clubs and the township divided among the clubs so that the canvass can begin. It was also pointed out that the various clubs would welcome help from any hunter who is interested in being of assistance. The clubs taking part are the Oakville Rod and Gun Club, Halton Sportsmen's Association, Georgetown Revolver Club, Appleby Gun Club, Georgetown Rod and Gun Club, and Maple Rock Shooting Range.

It was pointed out that in the past the officers have not enforced this law because they already have more work than they can handle but the officers agreed that current conditions warrant them checking with the Minister of Lands and Forests to



During the week of Nov. 30 - Dec. 6 inclusive, officers of the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at Milton detachment worked a total of 1,050 hours, and patrolled a total of 9,346 miles on Provincial highways, County and Township roads under their jurisdiction. Traffic violations resulted in summonses being issued to 59 motorists while 31 others were warned regarding their driving habits. Proceedings in Provincial Court in Milton resulted in 91 convictions being registered.

Charges were laid against eight drivers involved, following investigation.

MOTORISTS! Here's a winter driving reminder. It's required by law to have clear driving visibility - front, sides and rear - whenever the vehicle is in operation. This means it's illegal to drive with windows steamed up, frosted over, or covered with snow. Weather conditions may make this difficult at times. But remember... you can't avoid a collision if you can't see one.

There were 32 general occurrences reported this week. Among this number were six thefts, two instances of breaking and entering, two wilful damage complaints, one assault, two fraud investigations, one investigation under the Liquor Control Act resulted in a charge being laid against one person. Two premises were found insecure by officers on night patrol and one impaired driver was apprehended. There were many other occurrences, however these were of a minor nature and required little investigative time.

## Establish school site policy

School sites in Halton will range from five to six acres for junior elementary schools and 16 to 18 acres for secondary schools, the Halton County Board of Education agreed in adopting a policy statement.

Provision was included for sites of smaller size if they adjoin a municipal park and fencing would be based on the school-park concept as well.

For junior and senior elementary schools the site should contain baseball back stop and diamond, soccer field with posts, jumping pits for field events. An asphalt playground area, equivalent to about 25 square feet per pupil for the rated capacity of the school would include basketball and volleyball standards in senior school and volleyball only for junior schools.

At secondary school sites the facilities would include a football field with goal posts, jumping pits for field events and tracks would be approved on the basis of individual schools.

School sites would be fenced on all sides.
