
Members worked voluntarily on the building all summer in order to have it ready for curling as soon as possible.

MOTORISTS! Here's a winter and patrolled a total of 9,346 driving reminder. Establish school site policy

School sites in Halton will range from five to six acres for junior elementary schools and 16 to 18 acres for secondary schools, the Halton County Board of Education agreed in adopting a policy statement

Provision was included for sites of smaller size if they adjoin a municipal park and fencing would be based on the school-park concept as well.

For junior and senior elementary schools the site should contain baseball back stop and diamond, soccer field with posts, jumping pits for field events. An asphalt playground area, equivalent to about 25 square feet per pupil for the rated capacity of the school would include basketball and volleyball standards in senior school and volleyball only for junior schools.

At secondary school sites the facilities would include a football field with goal posts, jumping pits for field events and tracks would be approved on the basis of individual schools.

School sites would be fenced on all sides

It was decided that a questionnaire be taken by members to all land owners in Esquesing and Nasiagaweya townships. Each club will try to put a member on the job of distributing the questionnaires.

Purpose of the questionnaires is to get the view of landowners in the areas in question so that the statistics can be presented to the local councils, along with a recommendation for a by-law that will regulate hunting sensibly.

Once again there were two representatives present from the Department of Lands and Forests. Discussions revealed that there is a Trespess law included in the Game and Fish Act, but that another section in the Act states conservation officers are not obliged to

enforce the Trespass Act. It was pointed out that in the past the officers have not enforced this law because they already have more work than they can handle but the officers agreed that current conditions warrant them checking with the Minister of Lands and Forests to

see if it is time this law should be enforced and if doing so

would be feasible. It was also decided that every organized club in Ontario should be contacted and urged to write letters to their M.P.P. urging that the Trespass Act be reviewed with a view to much higher

It was also decided that these clubs and the Federation of Anders and Hunters should be urged to apply to the Minister of Lands and Porests for the introduction of legislation that would make it mandatory for all persons applying for a hunting license to produce proof of lubility insurance.

At a meeting held last night (Tuesday) the questionnaires were distributed to the virious clubs and the township divided among the clubs so that the calwass can begin.

It was also pointed out that the various clubs would welcome help from any hunter who is interested in being of assistance.
