

CARVING THE HOLIDAY TURKEY



1. Start with fully cooked turkey and sharp knife. First remove leg by cutting between the body and thigh.



2. Cut through thigh muscle to thigh joint.



3. Cut through thigh joint and drumstick (now in two pieces, drumstick and thigh).



4. To cut drumstick—hold at 45 degree angle to plate and carve down, turning to get several slices.



5. To cut thigh, cut parallel to thigh bone to get several slices of dark meat.



6. To cut breast—make one slice upward just above wing, deep into breast.



7. Cut remaining slices down from the wing.
