### THE MARKET.

There are signs of a revival of interest in the produce market. The permanent success of any market depends upon whether or not competitive prices are offered. ### THE TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

Last year Mr. Cook also spoke of retiring, but what his present intentions are, we have not learned. He also, for a long period, has devoted himself to the interests of the township and deserves the respectability of his fellow citizens. Mr. Campbell and Mr. McElbain are both popular with the electors and can poll a vote with any of them. There are indications that aspirants for municipal honors are more and more realizing the duty of introducing public utility municipal affairs. May this tendency go on growing.
