# Willoughby Elected Reeve!

He Receives the Largest Majority Ever Given to a Georgetown Reeve - Old School Board Re-Elected.  
The municipal election in town on Monday resulted in the election of Mr. J. A. Willoughby as Reeve, by the following vote:  
Willoughby 123  
Hudson 77  
Majority for Willoughby 46

This was the largest majority ever given in the history of the town, Mr. Willoughby being elected by a margin of 46 votes over his nearest competitor, Mr. Hudson. Mr. Willoughby was accompanied by "Sandy" McLeod, who acted as his spokesman, and Mr. Willoughby, in his acceptance, which the Reeve had served a supper to the board and a number of others, at the Bennett House, which was opened by Mr. Willoughby and a number of his friends. After all present had partaken of the good things provided a number of speeches were made. Mr. Wm. McLeod was in the chair and expressed great pleasure at the result of the election. He had been Reeve for nineteen years but never knew a majority up to the present to be mentioned. He was sure that Georgetown had done the proper thing in electing Mr. Willoughby as Reeve. Remarks were made by Mr. Marshall, Mr. Coffin and Mr. Schumaker.

The speakers were of the opinion that the right man had been selected for the right place and that the town had every reason to be proud of being so fortunate as to have a man of Mr. Willoughby's character to fill the highest position in the town to offer. They heartily endorsed the action of the voters of Georgetown in giving Mr. Willoughby such a rousing vote and wished him every success in the coming year.  
Mr. Willoughby is a Conservative in politics and the various speakers remarked that it was pleasing to note that the voters of Georgetown had held fast to the old and were harmonious in serving the best interests of the town. Mr. Willoughby made a neat reply, heartily thanking those who had elected him to the position of Reeve. He felt unable to express his gratitude to the many good friends he had made since coming to Georgetown. He also thanked the board and wished one and all a happy and prosperous New Year.
