Don't Buy Watered Oysters.

Oysters should never be watered or packed directly in ice. The ice should be around the container. Otherwise the sharp, jagged edges of the ice cut, scratch and batter the oysters, spilling their looks and ruining their delicate flavor.

The oyster is a salt water shell fish.

When put into fresh water it puts up

and loses its pleasant, piquant flavor.

It is just as unnatural to soak oysters in ice and fresh water as to subject a fish, after it has been caught, to salt water.
