One fact which is being presented for their consideration is that western manufacturers do not show sufficient enterprise in competition with American firms. There is reason to believe that there is a great deal of truth in this, and it is up to the manufacturers' association to see that more enterprise is displayed by its members. The same complaint had been made by trade commissioners in Australia, New Zealand and other points. If the Canadian manufacturers expect to retain their markets it is up to them to exert themselves in supplying customers, so that there will be no such complaint in regard to their unenterprising methods of doing business.
